COMMISSIONER'S PROCEEDINGS

Red Cloud, Nebr. May 3rd
 The County Board of Commissioners met as per adjournment at 1 o'clock p. m., with all members present.

Motion made and carried that the County Treasurer be instructed to strike off the assessment of the Red Cloud Produce Co for the year 1919. Same being an erroneous assessment.

The report of Vencil Zajic, Road Overseer of District No. 11 was approved by Board.

County Treasurer instructed to refund to Mrs. Alice Hosmer the proper amount due her on the sum of \$3350 actual value on her 1919 Personal Tax. Said amount being given in by her on 1919 schedule through error.

County Treasurer instructed to reduce the 1919 real estate tax of Mrs. Ida Marshall by \$200 actual value on her property in Garber's Addition to Red Cloud also to collect tax due for 1912 less the interest on same.

County Treasurer instructed to refund over charge on real estate tax for 1919 on Lots 4 and 5, block 18, Morey's Addition to Blue Hill owned by W. A. McMahon. Said property being assessed \$900 for improvements which had been removed from lots prior to 1919.

A petition requesting that a license be granted to W. R. Burwell to conduct a pool and billiard hall in Inavale at the expiration of his present license was presented to Board. June 21st at 2 o'clock p. m., was the time set for the hearing of this petition and County Clerk instructed to publish the notice of said hearing as provided by law.

Motion made by Shidler and seconded by Waldo that Line precinct now in Commissioner District No. 3 be placed in and become part of Commissioner District No. 4 Webster County, Nebraska. Motion carried.

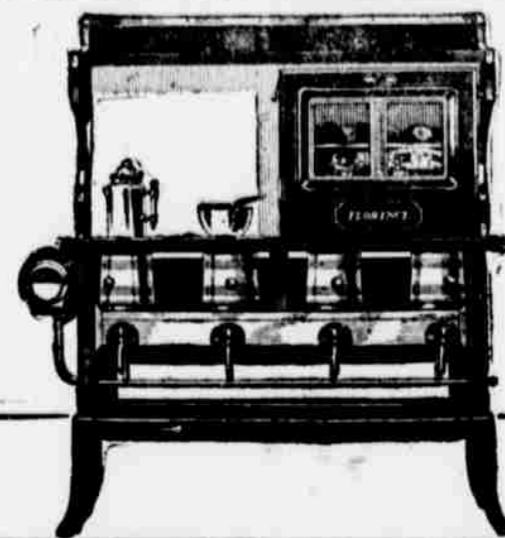
