### THE WAR MEMORIAL

We have had something to say about the proposed Nebraska War Memorial to be erected at Lincoln in honor of all Nebraskans who went to war.

H. S. McNobb of Omaha called on us yesterday and stated that he came to our city to interview our patriotic men and women and to enlist their co-operation in the work necessary to provide a magnificent building which will express the profound gratitude of the people to the boys who wore a uniform. The structure will commemorate the deeds of valiant Nebraskans in all the wars.

Mr. McNobb is a special representative of the general committee of 500 composed of men and women residing throughout the whole state. He tells us that the memorial drive will begin June 6, and that it will be promoted by local committees in all the counties.

Mr. McNobb was sent to our county to interview the men and women named on the county committee, and others whose assistance is solicited by the general committee. He explained the details of the big drive and he tells us that he received much encouragement in his interviews with our people. He said that a special committee had been appointed for Lincoln, of which Guy E. Reed is chairman, and another special committee for Omaha, of which Charles T. Kountze is chairman. These two committees will undertake to raise \$200,000 in each of these cities for the building fund of the memorial.

The remaining counties of the state have been assigned to the general committee which has named an executive committee, of which Judge Vincent G. Haseall is executive secretary, with offices in Omaha. This committee will try to raise \$600,000 through popular subscription of patriotic men and women, and the amount will be pro-rated among the counties according to population and wealth.

Mr. McNobb tells us that the committee was organized in response to many calls from various portions of the state for concerted action that would produce a fitting tribute to the 60,000 Nebraskans in the great war, and to other thousands who fought in previous wars. He said that it was only necessary to tell the people of the organization and its purpose to enlist their immediate co-operation. The members of our county committee have been appointed as follows: W. A. Sherwood, chairman; C. F. Cather; C. H. Miner; B. W. Stewart.

W. A. for 21 years. During that period he had paid in a total of \$406.90. ### WAR RISK INSURANCE

Former service men are notified by Director R. G. Chomley-Jones of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance that a new official circular of information listed as "LD-9" and entitled "New and Liberal Features of War Risk Insurance," is now issued.

The text of this bulletin is based upon the latest amendment to the War Risk Act which permits payments in one sum on converted insurance in case of death, and enlarges the permitted class of beneficiaries in the case of both War Risk (Term) and converted insurance.

The circular is printed in booklet form, illustrated by charts, and has an index by the use of which any ordinary question about government insurance may be readily answered. A copy of the booklet may be obtained by writing to the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Washington, D. C., or upon application to organizations of former service men and welfare organizations cooperating with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance.

Former service men whose insurance has lapsed or been canceled, and who wish to reinstate it or convert it, or to effect both these processes at the same time, are advised to secure a copy of the official form described as "LD-8," "Good News For All Ex-Service Men," which is a combination of information sheet and reinstatement and conversion blanks, the latter to be filed out, detached and mailed directly to the Bureau.

Regardless of how long a service man has been discharged or how long his insurance has lapsed or been canceled, he may reinstate his War Risk Insurance at any time before July 1, 1920, or within eighteen months after his discharge, if that be a later date, and upon payment of only two monthly premiums on the amount of insurance he desires to reinstate, with a satisfactory statement of health.
