FROM THE CAVE OF GLOOM

Good old Doctor Bryan will now proceed to entertain the country, for a few weeks, with a first class imitation of Achilles sulking in his tent. As a sulker the Old Doctor is non-pariel. We have learned by long experience in Nebraska that he always sulks when he is not permitted to have his own way. We have learned how brave, to the point of hardihood, he is in criticizing democratic platforms and maligning democrat candidates when neither he nor his dearly loved and trusted brother have been permitted a place on the ticket or a seat in the band wagon.

Distinctly it was not as the driver of the band wagon that Mr. Bryan came out of San Francisco. It was as the driver of the hearse. And he claims, dolefully, that his heart is in the grave and that he must have a plenty of time to consider what to do about it.

Mr. Bryan got, at San Francisco, precisely what he deserved. He went to the national convention with a toma hawk in one capacious alpacca pocket and a bottle of vitrol in the other. And concealed in his generously broad waist band was the knife which, with sweetly honeyed words, he proposed to sink under the fifth rib of Woodrow Wilson, the president of the United States and for eight years the superb leader of his party.

The Old Doctor used his entire arsenal with wild and reckless abandon, and was able to do it without qualms or fears since he had not the remotest chance of getting the nomination for himself in any event. But in not one of his forays, or charges, or stealthy approaches, did he succeed in reaching his objective. He failed in writing a bone-dry plank into the platform. He failed to emasculate the league of nations and supplant Wilson with Lodge as the democratic leader. He failed to secure the presidential nomination for Muggrave of Alabama or Callahan of Kentucky, whose claims he gravely urged in the syndicated newspaper articles by means of which he thriffully more than defrayed his convention expenses. He failed even to achieve the purpose of his vicious assault on William G. McAdoo and Woodrow Wilson, whom he assuaged as "the dynasty" and "the royal family," because while he expected McAdoo to obtain the nomination, and thereafter to write under the Bryan-come assaults, the nomination went elsewhere--and to a candidate he dislikes almost as much as he hates Wilson and McAdoo.

Mr. Bryan's old-time and devoted followers were not with him in the convention. They remained loyal to the ideals of the great president whom Bryan himself had ungrudgingly forced as a candidate upon the party eight years before. They were there not as wreckers, but as builders; not to vent hatred and spite but demonstrate their devotion to the party and the great cause it fights for. They felt, and rightly, that the Old Doctor had so rendered his side of democratic leadership a bad name he had forfeited his right to be a leader of the party and to lead on the war clouds broke and the storm of peril and death descended upon the great republic. They felt that a leader who had deserted under fire should not be permitted to recapture his leadership when the danger was past. And they did not permit him to do it. They helped to make up the almost unanimous decision by which of which Mr. Bryan, while applauded for his courageous courage was politely given his hat and shown to the door.

And so naturally our old friend is sulking, and in his sulks drools his old familiar nonsense about the democratic party having surrendered to the reactionaries and will arrest and the liquor interests. If there were no such things as Wall street and reactionaries and liquor interests on earth Mr. Bryan would have to create them to provide himself with epithets. Whether in good time Mr. Bryan shall emerge from his cave of gloom and give faint-hearted reasons why, after all, his conscience obliges him to support the ticket, it must come to time to disclose, meanwhile--and if forever--the democratic party with all that it fights for will march prospering--not that its platform, promises will inspire it, right down the line.--World Herald.

From all we can learn from the railroad company the car shortage will be much worse this year than last and we believe where it is possible it will pay you to stack your grain or make arrangements to bin it for a while. We believe new wheat will start off at a good price but with a good foreign demand in sight we look for a better market a little later.

Our storage capacity here is small, but with your co-operation we are sure that we can handle your grain and do it to your advantage.

We want you to feel that this is your business and to take a personal interest in it for without your individual interest and co-operation we cannot make a complete success. If at any time we can give you any information in regard to the markets, or can be of any service to you in any other way, please call on us.

We will soon be in our new office and will have the proper office equipment to handle your business as quickly and with as small an expense as possible. Remember that you get all that your grain brings on the market less the small expense it takes to handle it when you do business with us. Is this not better than doing business with an individual firm and having your grain pay both expenses and a profit to the owner? For this reason we feel that it will pay you to make some arrangements and hold your grain for a short time, if on account of the car shortage we are unable to handle it as soon as it is threshed.

We again thank you for your past patronage and co-operation.
