Elsewhere in this issue will be found a notice to property owners to cut the weeds on and around their premises, within five days, otherwise the city will perform the task and charge the same to the property owners. We are with the authorities in this matter to a certain extent—that weeds should be cut. But from experience we have found that a good example set by the city in authority over the tax matter, and command them to do the "weeding" is a glance over the town, with weeds and grass growing and growing a beautiful crop. It will also be noted that the grounds of the streets adjacent to the newly paved streets are littered with rubbish, concrete, etc., and in many cases the same dumped onto the lots of the property owners. Who is to be the most in this cleaning? A little cleaning, also, in the gutters adjoining said streets would not go amiss and in many cases there is no drainage from the pavement and water stands on the crossings, from three to twelve inches deep after each rain. The property owners are willing to do their bit—will the city meet them half way?

WHEAT AND OATS INSPECTION

Mr. Frank Kiem of the Agronomy Department of the University Farm, spent Tuesday and Wednesday, inspecting Kanred wheat, Nebraska No. 21 and Burt oats. Webster county farmers will be able to secure some good seed of the improved varieties of wheat and oats for next year's planting.

In an effort to provide sources of seed supply from high yielding varieties of wheat and oats, the College of Agriculture has inaugurated a seed inspection service.

Farmers growing Kanred wheat, Burt and Nebraska No. 21 oats, had their fields inspected and notations made of noxious weeds, purity, smut and rust. Another inspection will be made after the grain is threshed. If the seed passes they will be given a certificate and other farmers in the county or state can secure seed from the improved varieties for seeding.

Webster county will have several thousand bushels of Kanred wheat, and several hundred bushels each of Burt and Nebraska No. 21 oats, that has not been spoken for. A list of the farmers growing improved seed will be made public immediately after the next inspection.

The inspection of wheat and oats found that the heads were filling good, and seed that was treated for smut had only a small trace of smut, while fields sown with seed not treated, from one to ten per cent of smut was found. It would have paid big to treat seed for smut this year.

Wheat fields had a small per cent of rye in them. Some have already pulled the rye and others will before harvest.

KANRED WHEAT

Kanred wheat originated at the Kansas Agricultural College in 1906, and today it is making Kansas famous. It is becoming well known in Nebraska, and there will be a big demand for it this fall. It grows taller, has a larger straw and larger, plumper berry and out-yields the Turkey Red.

NEBRASKA NO. 21 OATS

Is an improved variety of Kershon oats that out-yields the old Kershon oats about eight bushels per acre.

BURT OATS

Burt oats grows taller than Nebraska No. 21, yields the same, and has a mixed color, being any color from white to black.

TEXANS TO VISIT NEBRASKA

The state of Texas has announced that it will send a special train carrying 125 young farmers to Nebraska to study agricultural methods. The boys will be selected by competitive examination in about 100 counties. The project is a part of the work of the Texas Agricultural College and the Texas Chamber of Commerce to improve farming and livestock raising. Bankers, business institutions, organizations and public spirited citizens are paying for the train. The object of the tour, which will include several northern and eastern states and southern Canada, is to give the representatives of the rising generation of Texas farmers an opportunity to see and study first hand the best methods and practices of the most successful farmers in the United States, and to fix in their minds high standards and right ideals of country life. During the last year hundreds of Nebraska purchased hogs were sent to Texas for breeding purposes and the young farmers especially are desirous to see some of the farms which produce these good hogs. The train will arrive at Lincoln the morning of August 9. Most of the day will be spent at the College of Agriculture. From Lincoln the train will go into Iowa.

Cox and Roosevelt Head The Democratic Ticket

Governor James M. Cox was nominated for President on the 14th ballot at the democratic national convention Monday night. He is a Democrat, both progressive and liberal, as during the three terms as Governor of Ohio, he had been a leader for humane and liberal legislation. Regardless of the outcome at the fall election the nation is assured of a printer and newspaper man, as president, for like his opponent he has worked his way from the ground up, in this profession. As an executive in his own state he has proven himself fair and impartial and a loyal servant of the people, and also a leader.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy was nominated for second place on the national ticket—vice president.
