On motion the meeting adjourned subject to call by the Executive Committee.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

The members of the League of Women Voters met Wednesday with Mrs. E. W. Stewart.

Miss Edith McKeighan was leader of the program on the nation wide Americanization plan of education for better American citizenship.

She called on several persons for topics bearing on the lesson: "America's Crisis in Assimilating the Foreign Population," by Mrs. S. C. Dickson. The Smith-Towner bill providing for a Federal Educational department, and which is endorsed by the National League of Women Voters, was read and provisions explained by Miss Stonebreaker.

Mrs. Harry Linton told of how the women citizens of Springfield were trying to get better acquainted with their foreign element by having an exhibit of 800 pieces of rare art of these foreigners.

Mrs. W. A. Sherwood read the questions asked by a district Judge of a man seeking naturalization papers here.

Mrs. J. H. Bailey read a new bill on the literacy test, which has formerly been vetoed by the last three presidents.

Miss McKeighan bro't before us some rather startling facts, when she said statistics showed 8,000,000 people in our country who could neither read, write nor speak English and by no means are we to think these are all aliens, either. The Americanization department of our government is not alone for the alien but for many of our illiterates.

"The most daring adventure any nation has ever undertaken is the admission into its national life and to participation in the responsibilities and rights of citizenship, of millions of people, speaking foreign languages, having been trained in different social customs, and having lived under different political institutions," says Charles Alvin Brooks.

America has undertaken that adventure and has become accustomed to the art of service. The war has taught our people many lessons, joyous and bitter alike, but above all it has bro't home to men that one of the glories of our common humanity is the privilege of service to one another irrespective of race, tongue or creed.

We are going to remedy some of this illiteracy by our compulsory education laws; thru education of adults by extension classes of the public schools; by specific qualifications for citizenship and more impressive ceremonies for naturalization; printed citizenship instruction in the foreign languages for the use of the foreign born, as a function of the Federal government and an educational qualification for the vote in all states after a definite date.

Women see definite things which are needed in our social structure and which men voters have never seen clearly enough to establish. This instruction in citizenship will be considered until public sentiment has made such a course an integral part of our public school system.

The committee has not completed the check system yet, but it will be finished soon. By the permission of the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, we will meet in the court house after this, on Wednesday afternoon's at 2 o'clock.

Until further organization is extended in the county all the country women are invited to these meetings at the court house. As there are 41 new amendments to the old state constitution to be voted on at the special election on Sept. 21st, and we have only 5 more weeks for study, we will discuss 8 amendments at each meeting and everyone is urged to study these for yourself and talk them over with your neighbor.
