

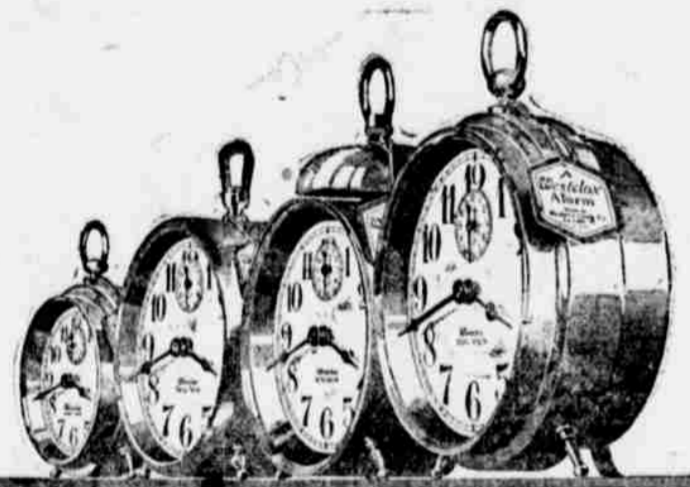

Commissioners Proceedings

Red Cloud, Neb.,
September 14, 1920.

The County Board of Commissioners met as per adjournment at 1 o'clock p. m. with all members present.

The Bond of B. W. Stewart as Justice of the Peace for Red Cloud City was approved by the Board.

A remonstrance signed by about 200 residents of Guide Rock precinct was presented to the Board asking them to rescind their action of August 3, 1920 authorizing the playing of Sunday base ball in said precinct.

After a discussion of this matter by the Board a motion was made by Spiller and carried that a hearing on this matter would be held by the Board at 10 o'clock a. m. October 5th, at which time parties favoring Sunday base ball and those opposing same are requested to be present, so that the Board can take the proper action on this matter. County Clerk was instructed to publish notice of this hearing in the Guide Rock Signal the two issues preceding the date of this hearing.

The request of the G. A. R. Society of Guide Rock asking the County Board to provide 15 markers for the Guide Rock cemetery was referred to Geo. H. Overing to investigate the price of markers and where they can be purchased. Mr. Overing to report on same at next meeting on October 5, 1920.

Attention! Wheat Growers

Saturday, September 18th will be wheat growers day in Webster county. On that day a meeting will be held in the court house, Red Cloud, for the purpose of organizing a Wheat Growers Association. In 24 other counties of the state the same kind of a meeting will be held on the same date, at which time a prominent wheat grower from one of our sister states to the south will give those in attendance necessary information concerning this organization.

Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas have already been organized and Nebraska is the next on the list.

The purpose of this organization is to remove the uncertainty of marketing wheat; to establish a minimum price, based on costs of production, investment, etc.

Cotton growers have their association, wheat buyers are organized, labor is organized, so why should the wheat growers not be organized, in order to protect themselves and derive a fair return for their investment and their labor?

The membership fee is so trifling that this matter should not stand in the farmers way and they are urged to attend this meeting at the court house, Saturday September 18th, at 2 p. m.

Farmers Institute Committees

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Farmers' Institute was held in the office of County Agent Henry R. Fausch, on Tuesday evening, presided over by President Col. J. H. Ellinger, at which time, as per previous announcement in these columns, it was definitely decided to hold this year's Institute the last week in October, from the 25th to 29th, inclusive.

Messrs. Chas. Stewart, C. J. Platt and Henry Fausch were appointed a committee to revise the premium list and take charge of the necessary printing.

Messrs. E. J. Overing, Jr., and Henry Gilham were named as a committee on finance; Johnson, Ellinger and Mizer, a committee on buildings and Fausch and Gilham on programs.

The following superintendents were selected: Horses—Johnson and Swartz; Cattle—Stewart and Nolan; Hogs—Sutton and Johnson; Sheep—H. H. Crowell; Poultry—E. J. Overing, Jr.; Farm Products—Frisbie; Farm Bureau Junior Products—Fausch.

The Hereford cattle sale is scheduled for Thursday, October 28th at 1 p. m., and the Shorthorn cattle sale for Friday, October 29th, at this same hour.
