Seed Electrification.

There appears to be much interest in the electrification of seeds and the application of electricity to growing plants, says the Scientific American. A recent account of work along these lines tells of a new method of aiding plant growth. The seeds, ten or 20 sacks, are placed in tanks provided with iron electrodes at both ends; the electrolyte is a solution of sodium nitrate or some other fertilizer. Particularly with cereals—wheat, barley and oats—the yields of both grain and straw are said to be increased. Some 500 farmers have taken up the treatment of the seeds, which is followed by a very careful drying in a kiln month or two before sowing.

Efficiency on Italian Farms.

The Italian ministry of agriculture is determined to make every acre in Italy do its bit. With this maximum production in view, an agricultural survey will be made to reveal every plot that is yielding less than it should. The backward farmer will then be given assistance in increasing the fertility of his land. In cases where the individual is unable, or unwilling, to co-operate, the government will insist on subletting or on a forced sale.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

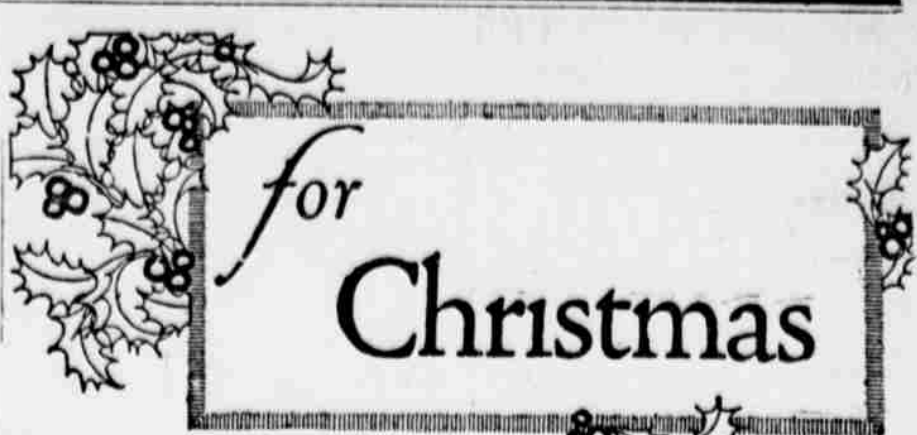

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

(By Superintendent)
The Department of the Interior at Washington is asking that all of the schools observe as school week, December 5-11.
During this week they are asking that teachers impress upon the children the purpose, the methods, the plans of the public school. They advise holding a community meeting, December 11 in each district to discuss how each particular school can be improved.
They ask that the teachers tell the children how the schools are supported, how they give equal opportunity to rich and poor alike, how they make for good citizenship, how they train the mind and fit one for self support and self advancement.
The teachers should show that it is through education that the child is to live up to the highest ideals of manhood and womanhood, is to attain all that in life is worth having. It is very important that the child attend punctually so as to be able to grasp these opportunities that his parents, together with the other adults of the district pay for and offer him. Make the child feel that he should strive that not one minute go to waste.
The teacher should feel that he has a sacred duty to perform, that he gives service that is without price—that he gives himself.
The parent should feel that the one thing worth giving his child is an education, is this chance to develop, is the chance to make good.
There is nothing like an education to make one do good work in the world and to make one stand well with his fellows. The parent should impress upon the child that he is here for service and that to do good service requires an efficient brain and a clean, well developed body and that nothing but the highest that the child is capable of is acceptable—that always and ever he must give his best.
Perhaps why so many poor men have become great is because they have loved an education and because of the sacrifices they have had to make to get it they have used it to good purposes.
Wisdom is better than riches especially if with this wisdom you have added the understanding to use it to a good purpose and with all of your might.
When a child has one middle sized attendance certificate then the six small one should be sent in and a seal asked for. The next six should be sent in with the middle sized certificate and the seal and a big certificate will be given. Teachers should designate whether a seal or middle sized certificate is needed. A child should have only one middle sized certificate.
Secretary J. M. Crabtree of the National Education Association is asking that all teachers join the association. The dues are \$2.00 per year. The association is doing what it can to forward the interests of the teachers throughout the country and is working for better qualified teachers with larger salaries. His address is:
