Commissioners Precedings

The County Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment at 1 o'clock p. m. with all members present.

The following official bonds were approved by the Board: Norman Phillips Constable, Red Cloud City, Clara McMillan Clerk of District Court, Henry Magarin Road Overseer, District 8 1/2, A. D. Ranney, County Judge, W. J. Oberhude Road Overseer District 2.

County Treasurer was instructed to take up the 1920 Protest Tax receipt of Mrs. Lois R. Christy of Guide Rock precinct and reduce her personal assessment in the sum of \$1000 and issue the regular tax receipt for the proper amount of tax less the \$1000 (actual value.) The above amount being assessed to Mrs. Christy through an error.

A petition by fifty-five legal voters of Guide Rock precinct was presented to the Board requesting the appointment of E. Peters as Justice of Peace for Guide Rock precinct, in place of Van Dunbar who was elected but will not qualify for the office. Motion made and carried that E. Peters be appointed to fill the said vacancy.

The resignation of O. C. Cockrane, elected Assessor for Inavale precinct and Claude Cramer elected Road Overseer for District No. 11 1/2 were accepted by Board.
