**DECORATION DAY TO BE POPPY DAY IN NEBRASKA**

Legion Adopts It As Memorial Flower

Memorial Day will be "Poppy Day" for the American Legion of Nebraska.

Arrangements are now being made by state headquarters so that all posts in the Department of Nebraska can obtain poppies on Memorial Day so that their members may pay tribute to those who made the supreme sacrifice.

At the last national convention of the American Legion the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, a movement has been instituted to adopt the poppy as the memorial flower of the American Legion throughout the nation, and whereas, out of this should come some symbol to perpetually remind us, and to unflinchingly teach coming generations the value of the 'Light of Liberty,' and our debt to those who helped to save it for us by paying the supreme sacrifice, and that we may not forget that,

'In Flanders Field the Poppies grow Between the crosses—row by row—' therefore, be it resolved by the American Legion that the movement to have the poppy adopted as the memorial flower of the American Legion be adopted, and be it further resolved that each member of the American Legion be urged to wear a red poppy on November 11 of each year, and be it further resolved that the national convention adopt the poppy as the official memorial flower of the American Legion."—Midwest Veteran.
