

Eight hundred Nebraska farmers representing seven different farm organizations met at Lincoln on Monday, March 21, and practically unanimously voted its approval of the grain marketing plan submitted by the Committee of Seventeen.

Seven delegates were chosen from Nebraska to attend the National Convention in Chicago on April 6, where this marketing plan will be further discussed and voted upon and directors for the National Organization will be elected.

Several Webster county men including the three delegates, Ira Wagoner, Dan Garber and H. G. Keeney, who were chosen by the Farmers' Union at the quarterly meeting at Guide Rock, were in attendance at Lincoln. Every county in this state was represented by the Farmers' Union yet despite this fact H. .G. Keeney was chosen as the man to represent the Farmers' Union at the National Convention in Chicago.
