**Mary Peterson Elected Mayor**

The city election held here Tuesday proved to be more interesting than heretofore, the principal contest being for the office of Mayor. It also differed from others on account of having two feminine contestants in the race.

With Miss Mary Peterson opposing Alf McCall, at the head of the ticket, a new interest developed. While neither of the candidates solicited votes 'tis rumored that their friends "tended to the lecturerin." The first report given out was that the lady lost by three votes, but a canvass of the votes showed that an error had been made in the unofficial count in McCall's favor. This gave Miss Peterson 10 votes.

The fond expectations of some of our citizens was let down hard when it was found that S. R. Florance won almost two to one over Joe Hewitt, for City Treasurer.

In the south ward the lady defeated her male opponent, Wm. Delaney, while in the north ward Ancil Crabill defeated Wm. McCallum.

O. C. Teel will continue to be City Clerk; only one vote cast against him.

On Sunday evening Dean Tynner of St. Mark's Pro-Cathedral, Hastings, will be here also Rev. Wm. Francis Mayo O. H. C. who will preach the sermon.

"Father" Mayo as he is familiarly known is one of the best mission preachers of the Episcopal church in the United States, and will stay in Red Cloud Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 11th, 12th and 13th, conducting a "Mission".

Evening service with address or sermon at 4 and 8 p. m. Everybody welcome.

**Council Proceedings**

R. F. Oatman, president of the City Council adjourned the regular session on April 5th, to April 6th at 8 o'clock p. m. owing to the Council Chambers being used as a place for holding the city election and at this time he called Council together in regular adjourned session with all members present.

After the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, Messrs. Roy Rust and A. B. McArthur, on behalf of the Fire Department, asked Council for additional fire hose. Their request was duly considered and the boys were informed that the city would immediately purchase 500 additional feet of 3 ply hose.

Phillip Traut next appeared before Council with a request that he be reimbursed for water main laid from Seward street to his premises at an outlay of \$122.98. After consideration the matter was laid over until the next meeting.

Neither was any action taken on a communication from the Watts Construction Company asking for the payment of \$579.80 held back by the city on contract at the request of the Engineer.

The City Engineer was instructed to prepare the assessment list for the County Clerk on Paving District No. 4. He was also instructed to prepare an estimate of the cost of extending the storm sewer on Eighth Avenue.

The Council then proceeded to canvass the vote of the City and School Election, held April 5, 1921, with the following results:
