

THE CODE TAX BILL

The more that Senate File No. 65, Governor McKelvie's code commis-sion tax bill, is studied by the people tide of indignant protest and opposi-tion. It appears, essentially, to be a bill to raise more revenues to meet the needs of an expensive code commission system of government, and to

realize the necessity of a building campaign in Nebraska are protesting. Some other interests, it is true, appear to be very well satisfied with the bill as the state senate is whipping it into shape. The railroads, stockyards, packing houses, banks, owners of stocks and securities in general, appear to be content.

Under the provisions of the bill farm property and real estate of all kinds is to be assessed and taxed on its full value. Local control over taxation is abolished and extraordinary powers are vested in the tax commissioner at Lincoln, with a force of tax ferrets under his hand, to insure that all tangible and visible property is listed and taxed at a full 100 per cent. But the intangible property, money, shares of stocks and securities, while listed at its actual value, is to pay a merely nominal tax of 4 mills on the dallar. The forms of 4 mills on the dollar. The farmer, the home owner, will pay a tax value, is to pay a merely nominal tax of from five to ten times as much, and in some instances even more than

One certain effect of such a system of taxation will be to cripple building trades, because it will more profitable to invest money securities than in homes and buildings. It will tend toward a shortage in homes, and a shortage in comes is the cause of the present burdensome rent and housing condi-tions that the legislature thought required a special committee to investi

The legislature might much better have made tax provisions to encourage home building. A provision exempting from taxation, say for a period of five years, buildings erected for homes, similar to that which has enormously stimulated building in New York, would much better have met the needs of Nebraska at this time. But the legislature goes to the other extreme, penalizes building and other extreme, penalizes building and industry, and awards the prize of a very low tax to the man who keeps his money idle. A farmer member of the senate has declared that he would have been a great deal of money ahead if he had sold his farm and stock in 1917 and invested the money in low interest securities. He might have remained idle, he said, instead of working hard and long hours, and would now be better off financially. A few more boosts towards a policy such as the administration proposes in Senate File No. 65, and the farm-ers may do it.—Omnha World Herald.
