Highway Association Meets

Beatrice, Neb., April 19.—Delegates from points in Iowa and Colorado were in attendance at the annual meeting of the Golden Rod Highway Association held in the chamber of commerce rooms here today. Over one hundred boosters residing along the highway from Nebraska City to Oxford registered at the morning session, which was followed by a luncheon. President J. W. Smith of Stratton presided. CERTIFICATES NOT OUT UNTIL JUNE

Owing to the great amount of work in preparing and distributing the certificates of service, which the state of Nebraska will give to every veteran of the world war, these documents will not be ready to be turned over to local posts of the American Legion until June. Such announcement has just been made by the office of the Adjutant General who has charge of the distribution of the certificates.

State headquarters of the American Legion had planned to have these certificates given out to Legion members by their posts on Memorial Day, but now it is expected that they can be given out on the Fourth of July, which would be very appropriate.

Over 56,000 of these certificates are now being packed in mailing tubes. Every world war veteran who enlisted or was inducted or commissioned in this state will receive one of them. They are very elaborate and will make a very nice keepsake.—The Midwest Veteran.
