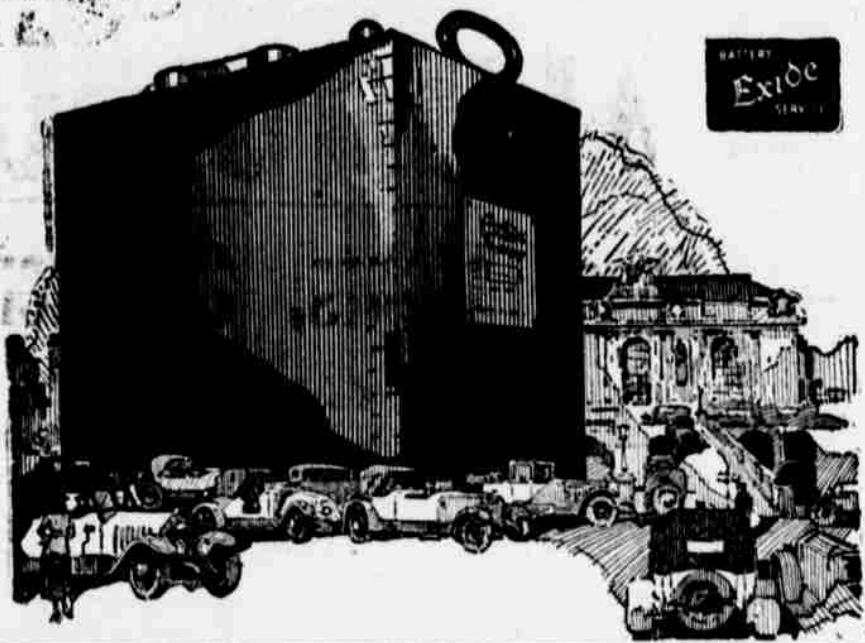

STATE BUREAU NOTES

Gage county stepped into the lead of the Gift-Corn project campaign last week and up to Saturday evening, had reported 5,027 bushels of corn, or approximately four cars. F. C. Crocker of Filley, director of the work in Gage county and a member of the executive committee of the State federation said that Gage would reach a full five car quota, as soon as all communities had been heard from.

Frank Myers, manager of the Farmers' Union State Exchange of Omaha, has just announced that wholesale prices will be given to farm bureau township secretaries in communities where there is no Farmers' Union store. Secretaries of these precincts can secure price lists by writing to the State Exchange. Not long ago, the Farmers' Union Livestock Commission Company of South Omaha passed a ruling offering to pro-rate the commission charges to all local shipping associations and strictly farmers' organizations in the state.

The seven Nebraska delegates to the Grain Marketing meeting in Chicago on April 6, and 7 took an active part on the program. H. G. Keeney of Cowles was a member of the Credentials Committee, J. N. Norton of Polk was a member of the Resolutions Committee and the other five delegates all took an active part in the discussion on pooling. Upon their return to Nebraska, the delegates expressed their satisfaction of the marketing plan as it was adopted.

C. H. Gustafson of Lincoln, Chairman of the Committee of Seventeen, before this committee went out of existence, was elected temporary chairman of the U. S. Grain Crushers, Inc. at Chicago recently. Mr. Gustafson was also elected director of this organization from the third district which includes Nebraska, South Dakota and Colorado. The other directors in this district are John T. Bell of South Dakota and J. D. Pancoke of Colorado.

M. L. Hunt of McComb, Illinois, who was sent to Nebraska two weeks ago to assist in bringing the Gift-Corn project to an early close, has returned to his home after making a satisfactory report to Carl N. Vrooman, Director of this project for the American Farm Bureau federation. From sentiment secured over the state, Mr. Hunt said that Nebraska should give at least fifty cars of corn.
