State Farm Bureau Notes

One million members this year, is the goal of the U. S. Grain Growers Inc., the new grain marketing company, according to C. H. Gustafson, president of the company, who recently visited his home in Lincoln. The membership campaign will probably be started in Nebraska within the next thirty days.

The Webster county Shorthorn breeders association was recently organized. C. B. Steward was elected president, C. W. Johnston, vice president and Fred Householder, secretary-treasurer. Mr. Householder and the county agricultural agent, Henry R. Fausch, were named to meet with like committees from other breed organizations, and with the fair associations.

On January 1, 1914, it cost 17.4 cents to ship 100 pounds of livestock from North Platte, Nebraska to Omaha. Today it costs 29.5 cents. And it cost 68.5 cents to ship 100 pounds of meat in 1914 from Omaha to New York City. Today it costs 132.5 cents. These figures have just been made public following an investigation made by the transportation department of the American Farm Bureau Federation at the request of Secretary of Agriculture, Henry C. Wallace.

According to J. N. Norton, chairman of the legislative committee of the state federation, all but two of the measures which the federation had officially entered were enacted into laws by the 1921 legislature. In making the above announcement, the farm bureau gives equal credit to the other farm organizations which aided in pushing farm legislation during the recent session. This is particularly true of the Farmers' Union, as their legislative program was very similar to that of the farm bureau.

A membership campaign was launched in Sheridan county on May 9th and will continue indefinitely. Sheridan county will be the forty-first organized county in the state to carry on a campaign. E. L. Bennett was recently named county captain and the campaign proper will be in charge of A. J. Dewald of Thayer county. Clean-up campaigns were conducted the past week in the following counties: Thayer, Otoe, Gage, Scotts Bluff, Lincoln, Custer, Johnson, Fillmore, Cuming, Douglas, Polk, Madison, Morrill and Holt.

Four hundred business men of Lincoln, members of the Chamber of Commerce, listened attentively to the fundamental principles of the U. S. Grain Growers Inc., as told by Clifford Thorne, general counsel, at their noon-day luncheon last Saturday. Mr. Thorne told the Lincoln business men that all the farmer is asking for is a chance to do business in a sane, constructive manner just as they are doing. In the afternoon Mr. Thorne addressed an interesting meeting of farmers in the Lindell Hotel.

Steps have been taken in Hamilton county to pool the 1921 clip of wool. All of last year's pool has been sold with the exception of the 5th and 3/4ths blood. The prices secured were as follows: Fine and medium clothing, 27 1/2 cents; 1/2 blood clothing, 27 cents; tags 5 1/2 cents; dead wool, 15 cents; fine seedy, 17 to 18 cents; medium black 10 1/2 cents to 17 1/2 cents; 1/2 blood staple, 29 cents.

After carefully considering the national grain marketing plan, as embodied in the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the U. S. Grain Growers Inc., the members of the board of directors of the Farmers' Union of Nebraska, have voiced their approval of the plan and have urged all Union members to give it their support. The Farmers' Union in Nebraska had 40,000 members and many of its state officers are assisting in promoting this new grain marketing plan.

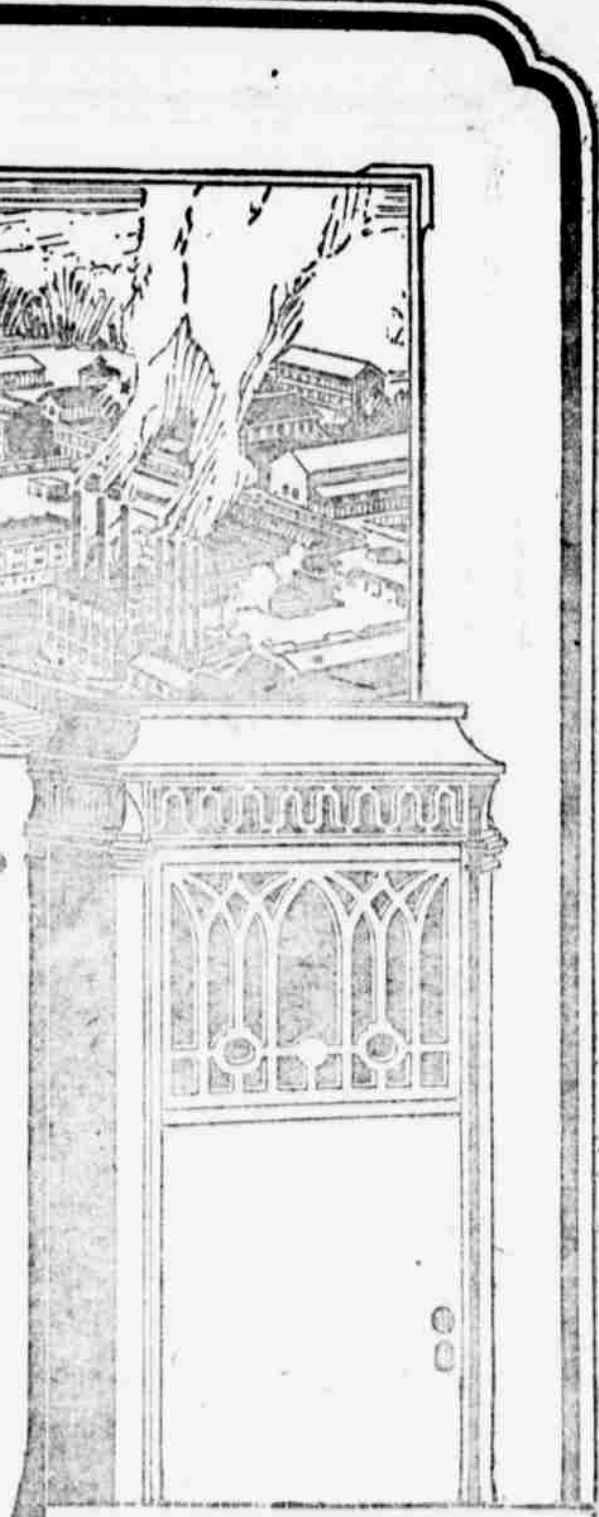
