COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
HOLD SHORT SESSION
Red Cloud, June 20-1921.

This being the date for one of the Statute meeting of the year the County Board of Commissioners met at 9 o'clock a. m. with all members present.

On motion the following Official Bonds were approved:

E. H. Vance, Road Overseer District 2½; John Steen, Road Overseer, District 15; W. E. Lambrecht, Road Overseer, District 15½; Rudolph Streit, Road Overseer, District 11½; Wm. Blobaum, Road Overseer, District 7½.

The application of Andrew S. Campbell for admission to the Soldier's home was approved by the County Board.

The resignation of C. R. Rakestraw as Justice of Peace for Greenwood Precinct was accepted by Board.

The County Clerk was instructed to issue duplicate warrants to Chas. R. Dickerson for \$3 and John Konzack for \$1.10. These parties having lost the original warrants.

A petition being filed in the County Clerk's office asking that the County Board grant W. R. Buswell a license to conduct a Pool and Billiard Hall on Lot 15 Block 12 in the village of Inavale for one year, said license to commence at the expiration of the present license July 8, 1921. The Board set July 8, 1921 at 2 p. m. as the time to hear this matter and County Clerk instructed to publish the proper notice of said hearing as required by law.

A resolution passed by the Webster County Farm Bureau on May 27, 1921, was read, asking the County Commissioners to publish the tax list for 1921 after a discussion of this matter by the Board a motion was made and carried that no action on this matter be taken at this time.

The claims of M. A. Albright, E. A. Creighton, J. McClintock and Charley Burr who had paid their taxes and filed their protest tax receipts with County Clerk were taken up and after investigation of same a motion was made and carried that no refund should be granted the above parties.

The County Treasurer was instructed to make the proper refund to E. Carter whose personal property through an error was assessed in School District No. 41 instead of District R for the year 1920.
