SHOT BY UNKNOWN PERSON

Franklin, Nebr., July 19.—The coroner's jury returned a verdict that D. S. Bingham of Lansing, Mich., who was killed Sunday morning on extra freight 1959 east bound, came to his death by being shot by someone unknown. The freight was in charge of Engineer Cox and was running between Republican City and Naponee. His body was found on top of a stock car, nine cars in front of the caboose.

Bingham was a member of hod carriers union number 334, Lansing, Mich. When found he had travelers checks in the sum of \$40. It is believed that he had been working in the Kansas harvest fields. He was shot thru the heart and was not robbed as he had \$3.60 in change on his person. The motive of killing is not known.

Soon after the train left the yards at Republican City, J. F. Waugh heard shots fired. There were about seventy-five to 100 bums and I. W. W. men in the yards and on the train when it pulled out. Several witnesses were held up by three masked men in Republican City at the point of a gun. A number of I. W. W. were known to be on the train. The body of Bingham was brought to Franklin and turned over to Sheriff R. F. Walker. The coroner's inquest by C. R. Stanenka, county attorney, was held today. Five of the fellows on the train were held to testify at the inquest. Two had I. W. W. cards. A telegram was sent to the union at Bingham's home at Lansing, Mich. An answer was received that the matter would receive immediate attention.—State Journal.

Famous Explorer and Discoverer of Incas' Descendants Coming

Deep in the heart of the South American jungles the official explorer of the Bolivian government, Dr. G. Whitfield Ray, discovered tribes of Indians who are believed to be the direct descendants of the ancient Incas. Dr. Ray succeeded in getting on very good terms with these unknown tribes and made a careful study of their customs, habits and traditions. He brought back with him the only "Official Club of Death" ever seen in civilized countries and will probably have it with him at the Chautauqua when he lectures here. This is the club the witch doctor used to kill all babies in excess of two to a family. Many other weird and heathenish practices will be related by the Doctor in his lecture. For fifteen years Dr. Ray gave his life to the attainment of knowledge regarding the vast unknown interior of the South American continent and is today considered the greatest living authority on interior South America. For his achievements in exploration Brazil named Mt. Ray in his honor and he was made a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of England. The accompanying illustration shows Dr. Ray on horse back clad in regular Gaucho costume. He is often referred to as the "Livingston of South America."
