Paving District No. 4. Amount of bonds \$2,000.00. Coupons \$240.00. Ordered issued on the 11th day of June 1920.

All of which bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

It is proposed to issue funding bonds in exchange therefor to bear no greater interest than six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

Any tax payer may file objections to the issuance of said funding bonds on or before the 23 day of September, 1921 in the office of the City Clerk of said City.

County School Notes
(By County Superintendent)

Last year out of 81 schools, twenty one reported to the Dept of Public Welfare the results of the physical examination given by the teachers and required by law. This year the Department ventures to hope they will receive reports from 100 percent. The examination should be given the first month.

Anyone wishing to give the "Health Crusade Work" in connection with the other school work can get the material by sending in to the court house for the same. It would be some trouble to the teachers but it is a good thing to have children enlisted in fighting for a good clean wholesome body. Especially should they be taught the importance of keeping their teeth in good shape.

Anyone wishing education in vocational subjects because of having received some injury that has made it impossible to carry on their usual occupation should get in communication with State Director of Vocational Education C. A. Fulmer whose address is 204 University Temple, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Thru some oversight of the State Department the examination grade of Glen Blauch was reported wrong and was not corrected until it was too late for him to get the school he had expected to get.

To Ex-Service Men

The act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921 and prior fiscal years and for other purposes, approved June 16, 1921, contains the following provision:

"That any person entitled under the provisions of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, as amended, to take vocational training must make application therefor within eighteen months, from the date of the approval of this act."

The above gives all men who are disabled or believe themselves disabled to a cause of the World War, up to and including December 16, 1922 in which to make application for vocational training, applications cannot be considered after that date.

The application for vocational training of any disabled ex-service person, either male or female will be interpreted to mean any written application from such person, expressing a desire for vocational training under the provisions of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, or the receipt of the Federal Board forms which are in use and have been in use to record the facts concerning any applicant whether such forms have been filled out by the applicant himself and returned to the Board or whether such forms have been filled out by a representative of the Board while interviewing the applicant. If any such applications from disabled ex-service persons are received on or subsequent to December 16, 1922 they will be considered on their merits without regard to the time limitation referred to herein, if such applications bear a post mark showing clearly that they were mailed prior to December 16, 1922 or other acceptable evidence is presented showing conclusively that such applications were mailed prior to December 16, 1922. These applications can be addressed to the Local Office in Kearney or the District Office in St. Louis, Missouri, Federal Board.

In the ninth district alone there are about 6000 men in training, with the various colleges, Universities, shops and many concerns, to this can be added 415 that have already completed their training successfully, with a wage increase of about two hundred percent, over their pre-war occupation. There are many in the state of Nebraska, who at the present time cannot, successfully enter training, and who are in such physical life's vocation.

The Federal Board is not a Department of the Army or the Navy and is not conducted along lines of military discipline; it teaches men to hold successfully a job or position according to their physical condition. The only rules applied are those which a man will encounter in the business world.

The state of Nebraska is ready to furnish a good living to any man outside of farming, many of these jobs and positions are ones to be desired by disabled men. It must be remembered that most of the men in charge of this training in the field for the Federal Board are ex-service men themselves who successfully passed the examination required by the Government for this work.

You do not have to sign any papers making a special contract such as an enlistment in the army, simply make your application for vocational training and compensation for disability received in the service. If the evidence submitted is sufficient to grant vocational training all there is to do is to enter training.

A letter addressed to the Federal Board, Post Office Bldg., Kearney, Nebraska, will receive a prompt reply. Now, buddy, don't mark time but make it lively and "get your name in the pot." Remember the limit is December 16, 1922.
