THE CITY COUNCIL

Mayoress Mary Peterson called Council together in regular session, in the Council Chambers, on Tuesday evening, with all members present. The report of the City Treasurer was presented and ordered placed on file. After considering the request of C. R. Lewis for a \$15.00 increase in salary, the same was denied.

City Engineer Geo. H. Overing, estimating it would cost \$84.00 to construct a walk on west side of Lots 10 to 12, Block 8 LeDuc's Addition, Clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of same.

The request of Dr. Sach of Omaha that the city send interest on warrants to U. S. National Bank, Omaha, for same to be endorsed on warrants and receipts returned, was rejected and it was ordered that the business be transacted along regular channels. City Light and Power Superintendent Frazier was instructed to remove light post at intersection of Fourth Avenue and Cedar streets.

At the request of A. B. McArthur and L. H. Rust, who personally next appeared before Council in behalf of the Fire Department, requesting that an ordinance be passed relative to the protection of fire hose during fires, the same was complied with.

After considerable discussion of road matters in Webster county the commissioners having charge of this road agreed to do all in their power to improve same as soon as possible.
