CLASS L—EDUCATIONAL

READ THESE RULES CAREFULLY

All entries and articles must be received not later than October 24th. Exhibit space will be assigned by the department superintendent. Positively no articles or entries accepted after the closing hour, 6:00 P. M., October 24th.

Each school exhibit article should be labeled carefully on the back with the name and address in full of pupil, school and county. No school, grade, club or individual should make more than one entry for the same premium or enter any article for more than one premium. The grade to which the pupil belongs must be shown and will be considered making awards.

All exhibits to occupy wall space should be mounted on cardboard 22x28 inches, with long dimensions of the cardboard to be exhibited in a vertical position. If any exhibit be too large for one card, use a larger card with size the multiple either in length or breadth or both dimensions of the regular 22x28 inch cardboard.

Prizes for collective exhibits in each of the several classes will be awarded according to the number of points scored by each competitor. First prizes shall count 5 points, second as 4. The school or the city of the county whose winnings total the greatest number of points will be the winner in each class.

Exhibits should consist of work done in the year. In order to have sufficient space to place articles for which premiums are offered, ONLY ARTICLES MENTIONED IN PREMIUM LIST WILL BE GIVEN A PLACE IN THE EXHIBIT.

ENTRIES.

Entries by individuals other than teachers, superintendents, or those in charge of exhibits for schools, are limited to persons under twenty-one years of age. It is not necessary that such exhibitors be enrolled in any school at the time of exhibiting.

PREMIUMS.

One article can compete for only one prize, and only one entry shall be allowed by a single exhibitor in each class. To each premium number there must be two or more different exhibitors to constitute competition. Where there is no competition, one-half money will be paid.
