SCHOOL NOTES
(By County Superintendent)

Any time that doctors get out of franked postals to report contagious diseases on, and will let me know I will send them a new supply.

There will be another contest for a trip to Washington. This time it will be a 500-word essay by the grammar school children on "How I Can Make The Highways More Safe."

Rules for the contest—

1. Any grammar school pupil 14 years old or younger.
2. The essay must be 500 words long.
3. The essay must be on the subject. It may tell about traffic rules, how to cross the streets, why children should not play on the roads, or any other means that will make the highways safe.
4. Each essay should be illustrated by a drawing or photograph clipped from a newspaper or magazine, or made by the contestant.
5. The name, school and home address of the pupil should be written in the upper left-hand corner.
6. Essays must be handed in to the school principal on or before December 10, 1921.

\$500.00 and a trip to Washington will be given to the grammar school teacher for the best class room lesson for the grammar school grades teaching children safe behavior on the highways.

Rules of the contest—

1. Any teacher of a class of the grammar school grades in the U. S. and territorial possessions may compete.
2. The prize will be awarded for the best lessons teaching children safety on the highways.
3. The lesson need not be on the subject of safety alone, but may be brought in as an integral part of a history, arithmetic, geography or any other subject.
4. It may take the form of a lecture, recitation, game, drama, manual training, or any other form which the teacher considers best presents the subject.
5. The contestant should write name, school and home address in the upper left hand corner.
6. Lessons submitted in the contest should be handed to the school principal or superintendent on or before December 10, 1921.

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES
(By County Superintendent)

For the benefit of the teacher, that have not taught a section of the law is here quoted: "Every teacher shall make a monthly return to the director of the district of the number of pupils attending his or her school, the names and ages of each, the days attending, the studies passed, and no teacher will be entitled to receive pay in full for a term's service until the term summary is properly filled out and approved by the director.

Nebraska League of Women Voters Essay Contest

Open to the High School pupils of Nebraska.

Ten dollars for the best essay in each congressional District.

Prizes are given by the Nebraska League of Women Voters.

These essays will be graded on substance & (thought etc.) form & (English, grammar etc.)

Requirements:

1. Paper-note book size 8 1/2 x 11
2. Write on one side only.
3. Signed by pseudonym.
4. Pseudonym also on sealed envelope fastened to the essay.
5. Pupil's name and school inside the envelope for final identification.
6. Each school will send the best one of its essays to the county superintendent so that she will get it not later than December 23, 1921.

The county superintendent will select a committee of three to pick out the best.

The county superintendent will send the essay to the District Director for the Nebraska League of Women Voters who should receive it not later than January 18, 1921.

The District Director will appoint a committee of three to select the best essay from the county winners for the congressional district.

The Executive Board of Nebraska League of Women Voters will select a committee of three to judge the best of the six.

8. General instructions—Keep very simple, tell the message in the shortest number of words, drawing and words should tell the same message, color should emphasize it.

STATE FARM BUREAU NOTES

Some of the barriers which stood in the way of securing a great quantity of war finance corporation money in Nebraska seems to have been put aside by the decision on the part of the corporation to advance money to Nebraska banks for paying depositors and establishing reserves.

The state law which prevents banks from loaning beyond their capital stock and surplus practically eliminated most banks from securing further money through the corporation. While money will not now be advanced for rediscount the new ruling will permit banks to rediscount their present loans in order to secure funds.

Secretary J. E. Hart of the state department of trade and commerce is recommending that county cattle loan corporations be organized to take advantage of the war finance corporation's announcement that it will loan up to ten times the capital stock of these corporations on good paper, which will eliminate the statutory provision limiting corporations to an indebtedness of two thirds of their capital stock.

H. D. Lute, secretary of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation has returned from Chicago where he attended the ratification meeting of the plan of the Farmer's Live Stock Marketing Committee of Fifteen. In a very short time announcement will be made as to just how the organization work will be carried on in this state to join in the national live stock marketing plan. The plan calls for the organization of incorporated live stock terminal commission houses on each of the important live stock markets, and the organization of local live stock shipping associations in communities as such. He said the plan will be carried out by the National Live Stock Marketing Association and members in all organizations will be invited to take the live stock marketing Stocker and feeder contracts are to also be organized in connection with the terminal commission houses. The plan must be all right, Secretary Lute said, "as I notice that the great live stock exchanges have already organized their fight on both the national co-operative live stock marketing plan and the Farm Bureau."

According to H. D. Lute, Secretary of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation, some bankers throughout the state are showing a certain amount of hostility to the Farm Bureau, particularly in the matter of collecting Farm Bureau memberships through the banks, even going so far as to advise members to cancel their memberships. "In some instances we are inclined to think the banker is laboring under a misapprehension of what the Bureau is trying to do for the farmer," Mr. Lute said, "but in the main we are suspicious that he is attempting to protect his correspondents in the east who are friendly to the grain speculator and those who have been making their profits off the farmer." Where bankers are unfriendly the Farm Bureau locals are being advised to organize their township headquarters in order to look after membership collections themselves.

The Hamilton County Shipping Association, organized by the county Farm Bureau reports that it is finding a market for light hogs for feeders and is outbidding the local buyer 21.30 per hundred. It is also getting in a large number of cattle from the sand hill country which are being fed by Hamilton county farmers for seven cents per pound gain, the owner taking chances on losses. The association is also paying three cents per pound for butter fat above the local buyer and returning a dividend of one cent per pound to the producer, while eggs throughout the season have averaged better than seven cents above the store prices. Hamilton county has proven that the local shipping association can be made a success.

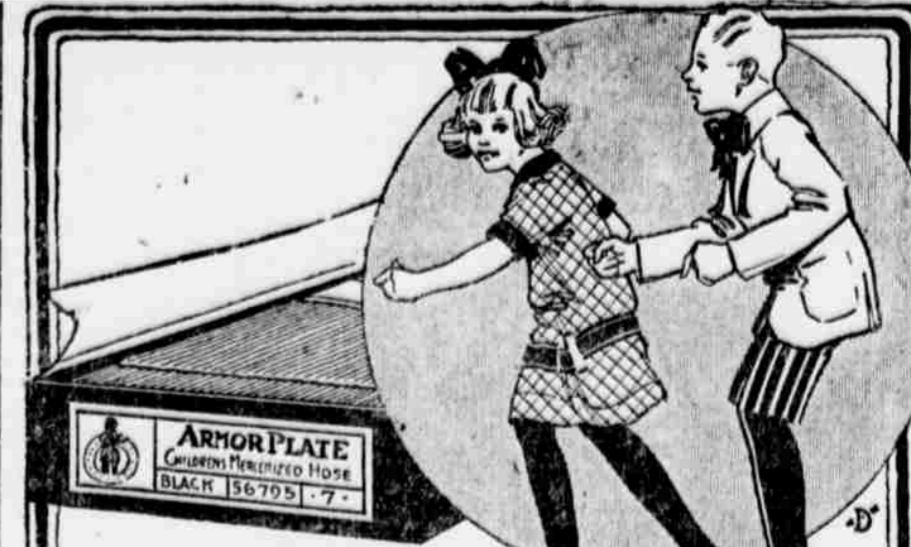
