Crabill's Barn Burned Down

Tuesday evening at 9:45 the L. M. Crabill livery barn on East Fourth avenue, one of the old land marks of the city, caught on fire and was burned entirely to the ground. This building was used by Mr. Crabill as a storage barn for his street cars and also as a livery for many years, and for the past few months it has been vacant. As soon as the fire bell rang the firemen responded quickly and by their efforts the old Holland House and the Cottage Grocery were saved. Grant Turner had his horse drawn hearse and Mr. Crabill had an old hearse and cab stored in the barn. Fifteen hundred dollars insurance was carried on the building and the contents. The building was practically consumed before the alarm could be given and there is little doubt but that the fire was of incendiary origin.

The officers of the Red Cloud Fire Department state that the next fire that breaks out in the business district of this city a strong report will be sent to the State Fire Marshal concerning the building and the owner of same. An occasional fire is to be expected, but during the past few months fires have been entirely too numerous to be consistent with the size of the city, and they have to fight fire with equipment the like of which has long been discarded by towns much smaller than this. The feeling is unanimous that this city can and should afford modern equipment.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TRANSACT MUCH BUSINESS

This being the date fixed for the first statute meeting of the year the County Board of Commissioners met at 10 o'clock a. m. with all members present.

Meeting called to order by the County Clerk. On Motion C. A. Waldo was re-elected chairman of the Board for the year 1922. Board adjourned to 10 o'clock p. m. Board reconvened at 1 p. m. all members present.

Chairman Waldo appointed the following committees for the year.

Bridge Committee District No. 1—Chaplin, Shidler and Stumphenhorst.
Bridge Committee District No. 2—Stumphenhorst, Waldo and Crowell.
Bridge Committee District No. 3—Waldo, Stumphenhorst and Crowell.
Bridge Committee District No. 4—Crowell, Waldo and Shidler.

Bridge Committee District No. 5—Shidler Crowell and Waldo.

Committee to check County Treasurer's office—Chaplin, Crowell and Waldo.

Committee to check all other County Officers—Shidler and Stumphenhorst.

Poor Farm Committee—Crowell, Stumphenhorst and Chaplin.

On motion the sum of \$100 was allowed the six newspapers of the county for publishing the Commissioners proceedings for the year 1922. Same to be divided equally between the six papers.

County Treasurer's Semi-Annual statements to be published by the Blue Hill Leader and the Commercial Advertiser same to be published at one-half the legal rates.

Delinquent Tax-List to be published by the Red Cloud Chief and the Bladen Enterprise. Same to be published at one-half the legal rates.

Motion made and carried that the Budget of expense necessary for the office of County Agent for the year 1921 be approved as filed with the County Clerk by the Webster County Farm Bureau.

A motion was made and carried that the County Clerk be instructed to advertise for Bridge Bids for the year 1922.

There being no bids filed for printing and stationery each officer was instructed to buy their necessary supplies in the open market where ever they can to the best advantage of the County.

On motion made and carried the County Superintendent was allowed a sum not to exceed \$800 for office help and expenses for the year 1922.

Motion made and carried that the County Assessor be allowed a sum not to exceed \$350 for office help for 1922.

Motion made and carried that the County Judge be allowed the sum of \$600 for clerk hire in his office for 1922.

On motion made and carried the following estimate of expenses for Webster county for the year 1922 was made and adopted.
