Nebraska has advanced from third place in the United States in per capita automobile ownership to second place, tying with California and South Dakota, according to a report compiled by the Omaha Bureau of Publicity. A year ago California held second place with per capita ownership of 5.7. Iowa was first with 5.4. Nebraska tied with South Dakota for third place with 5.9. This year's figures show Iowa still in first place with per capita ownership of 5.2. Nebraska, California and South Dakota follow with per capita ownership of 5.3 and Kansas is third with 5.9. This information has been obtained by the Publicity Bureau thru a questionnaire sent to registration departments of the various states.
