COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Red Cloud, Nebr.
May 2, 1922

The County Board of Commissioners met at 11 o'clock a. m. as per adjournment with all members present.

Moved by Crowell and seconded by Chaplin that for the purpose of employing in a profitable manner all persons who have heretofore been or may heretofore be sentenced to hard labor in the jail of this county such persons shall be employed in road work on the Public Highway of this county as the County Board of Commissioners shall direct. Such persons while engaged in such road work shall be under the supervision and control of the Road Overseer or Patrolman of the Road gang he is working and for this purpose the County Jail shall extend and include the Public Highways of the county. Motion carried.

The Bond of John Hansen as Road Overseer of Dist. No. 11 B was approved by Board.

The bonds of the following Road Patrolmen were approved by Board; Wm. R. Topham, Wm. E. Beitler Jr., Geo. A. Merrill, Fred Foe.

A petition was presented to the Board signed by J. L. Ashmore and 27 other residents of Glenwood Precinct asking for the appointment of S. F. Green as Justice of the Peace of Glenwood Precinct. Motion made by Chaplin seconded by Stumpfenhorst that the aforesaid petition be granted Motion carried.

The County Judge informed the Board that a bequest of \$50.00 under the will of Willard Trine in 1910 had never been claimed by party entitled to same, and under the laws of the state of Nebraska this amount would revert to the General Fund of Webster county. On motion made and carried County Judge Ranney was instructed to pay this \$50 to the County Treasurer.

In the matter of T. M. Boner who had paid his 1921 tax on the S¹/₄ of SW¹/₄ of section 16-2-10 under protest, no refund was made and County Treasurer instructed to issue the regular tax-receipt for the amount as shown on 1921 tax books.
