**Kansas City Merchants
Visit This City Today**

One hundred and twenty-five representatives of the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce arrived in Red Cloud right on time at 9:35 this morning. President Edw. O. Faeth, of the Kansas City Chamber, along with Mayor Frank H. Cromwell and John W. Jenkins III, Chairman of the Trade Extension Committee, headed the party.

"We are out to meet old friends and make new ones" President Faeth stated on arrival here. "We want to get better acquainted with the business men in the Kansas City trade territory, we want to know them better, we want to see something of the conditions in this territory, and we are mighty well pleased with what we have found".

Every man in the party was on the station platform immediately after the train stopped and they together with their band were brought up town by our citizens. While the visitors were calling on the merchants their band rendered several selections and a large number of souvenirs were given the children.

The party is out on a seven day trip, visiting sixty-nine towns in Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado and Kansas, and covering approximately 1600 miles. A private train of twelve cars, including two seventy-two foot baggage cars, two diners, a chair car and seven pullmans made up the equipment used by the Kansas City party. It is equipped throughout with radio instruments so that the party can pick up whatever messages are broadcasted either from Kansas City or Denver.

"That the business men of Kansas City were well pleased with the territory selected for this year's trip was indicated in the quick response made to the first announcement of the 'trip' John W. Jenkins III, Chairman of the Trade Extension Committee, stated. "No difficulty was experienced in getting our full quota, and now that we are on the trip everyone is well pleased with the territory we are covering".

On their return, the members of the team told their school-mates of their trip and the contest. This is the second winning stock judging team Webster county has out of three.
