The Department of Public Welfare complains that districts, 5, 11, 12, 13, 14, 17, 20, 25, 27, 29, 30, 32, 34, 35, 35, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 46, 48, 50, 53, 54, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, 63, 65, 66, 68, 69, 70, 72, 78, 80, 81, 83, 84, 85, 87, 90 did not return to them the questionnaire and birth blank made out, that had been sent to them some time ago. The teachers have had a great deal of this kind of work to do, almost more than they can attend to; still it is for a good purpose and we should do all we can to help along a good cause. If the teachers still have them on hand perhaps they could get some of the older children to help them in making them out.
