FAIRS

The season of fairs is again here. The Webster County Fair is August 22nd to 25th at Bladen and the Nebr. State Fair at Lincoln, September 3rd to 8th.

Fairs are looked upon by some as a holiday which it rightly is. You get at a fair what you go for, be it education, amusement, relaxation or trouble. In most cases you will find the "Midway" much more crowded than the stock sheds. The majority of the best fairs are cutting out poor shows and gambling devices and are trying to give instructive amusement.

Fair associations as a whole aim to give folks what is wanted. Let the folks demand more purebred stock and a clean midway and you will get it. Both are needed. We are human but let's keep the right balance. Some fairs leave behind them a flattened pocket-book, regrets, disease and broken hearts. Let us demand fairs that will safeguard our children. Let's plan on attending fairs and when you go make up your mind to get the best out of it. New things improved livestock are shows for your benefit. About next Monday, we presume the new dam across the Republican will be commenced. The new company are rapidly progressing with their business and THE CHIEF felt certain that with its reopening and with the enterprising men behind the project that there will commence a new era of prosperity for Red Cloud as it is certainly one of the best water powers in Nebraska, and when once properly utilized by other commercial and manufacturing interests, there will spring up big inducements for people to move here. The mill and electric plant will be in full operation by Oct. 1st at least. Our people ought to feel highly elated over the project.

Junior Chautauqu Work

The Junior chautauqu work is always a feature of the Midland Chautauqu Circuit. Mrs. Don C. Rogers, wife of the Platform Manager, was Junior Supervisor. Miss Jessie Crabb was Assistant Junior Supervisor.

Every morning the children met at the tent for games and pageant practice. They played volley ball, the younger ones played with bean bags, indoor base ball etc. Friday the Juniors held an Indian Pow-Wow. They had a fire and roasted weinies and had a general good time.

On Tuesday, Aug. 1st, the Juniors staged a pageant, "The Conquest of Peace." This was a musical pageant in costume. During the week the children practiced daily drills in preparation for the final day when they appeared in public.

66th Cav. Div. U. S. Army

We are having some difficulty in getting men for the 66th Cavalry Division (Organized Reserve) and it occurred to me that co-operation between the Departments in charge of the personnel of the 66th Cavalry Division and the National Guard might result in a mutual benefit.

This Corps area includes a list of states in which cavalry material is very rare and what there is is greatly scattered. In many cases it has been found that men desire to enter one particular branch and no other. For instance, a man desires to serve in National Guard Cavalry and if the State has no cavalry he simply does not enlist at all.

Will it be practicable to ask that your Recruiting Officers be requested in case they find such men to let them know that there is such a thing as the 66th Cavalry Division in this Corps area which of course includes the State of Nebraska.

The Headquarters of this Division and Special Troops of this Division are located here in Omaha. There are of course many ex-officers and soldiers who are qualified for commissions who are scattered throughout this state who need but know of the existence of the 66th Cavalry Division to have their interest aroused.
