Teachers' Institute this year will be August 28, 29, 30. We are hoping to have a very practical, helpful institute.

While Superintendent Gelwick was at summer school this year he found some very splendid work being given by a Miss Earhart and advised getting her to give something of the same order here. I was unable to do this but I have prevailed upon Mr. Gelwick to bring as much of this to us as he can within three short days. He will come back from summer school full of his subject and anxious to share his advantages with us.

Mr. Eastham of Harvard Consolidated Schools will give a series of lectures and round table conferences that will be very helpful.

Mrs. Greves Truax of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, is one of the best instructors in the country along the line of methods, courses of study and so forth. We have had to speak two years ahead to get her and she is well worth the extra trouble.

There will be other good things, as many as we can pack within the short time allotted to Teachers' Institute, such as talks, lectures from the Department of Health and so forth. Programs will be sent out soon.

The tenderest of sympathy from the people of this community goes out to the mother and other relative in this, their doubly hour of sorrow.
