Agricultural Fair Opened Tuesday With Good Exhibits

The Webster County Agricultural Fair is now in full swing in this city. Monday a number of men were busy engaged in putting up flags and banners on Webster street which makes it look like a Fourth of July celebration. Sunday the live stock men commenced bringing their choice cattle, hogs and sheep to the sale pavilion, and by Wednesday morning this barn was full of the best stock that has ever been exhibited here; some of which took first prizes at the State fair.

Tuesday was entry day and the poultry department and farm products space, which is on display at the Farmers' Union, was soon filled up and space was at a premium. Although this has been a poor season to secure farm products for exhibit which is on display, is very good. The poultry department, which is one of the best resources on the farm, has a large variety of breeds on display which typifies the interest that is being taken in this vocation.

The Home Economics Department, the School display and fruit is on exhibit at the Peterson building and it is stated by those who are in a position to know that the entries are better than ever, which speaks highly for those in charge of this department and also the exhibitors.

Last, but not least, is the horses and mules which are being shown at the Tie barn. Although the entries are not as large as the hogs and cattle, they make up in quality for the numbers shown.

Tuesday evening the High School students re-played their musical comedy, "Miss Cherryblossom," at the Auditorium. A large number were present to see the play and the students rendered their parts much more efficiently than when they presented the play the first time.

Wednesday morning the judging of exhibits commenced and will be completed today, Thursday. The opening program was held at the Auditorium in the evening and the seating capacity was soon filled up, and many were unable to gain admittance. President E. J. Overing, announced the program for Thursday, after which Henry Fausch introduced the Blue Hill High School judging team, who won first place in the contest held Wednesday morning.

The opening number was a selection by the quartette, Mesdames Bush and Gellatly, Messrs Bush and Thomas, with Miss Jessie Crabill at the piano accompanied by J. E. Betz with his violin. The selection was rendered in a very capable manner and pleased the audience. Messrs Hardman and Betz rendered two violin duets in a very pleasing and creditable manner. Mrs. Gellatly sang a very beautiful solo and also rendered two more pleasing selections in her usual professional manner, after which Rev. Hardman gave two violin selections and Ralph Newhouse three entertaining numbers on a saxophone that were greatly enjoyed.

Prof. Cornman, of the State Agricultural College, who judged the poultry exhibit, was present and gave a talk on poultry and also an illustrated lecture on the same which gave those present many new ideas in the handling of poultry. Stone and Stone closed the program with a vaudeville stunt in their usual entertaining way.

The officers, directors and merchants also the exhibitors, are to be highly commended in making this year's show the best ever, and may the years to come bring forth bigger and better shows for the untiring interest they have given this year.
