Kendrick Leads in Wyoming

Cheyenne, Wyo.--Returns from fifty-nine precincts of the 659 in Wyoming show that United States Senator John B. Kendrick, democratic candidate for re-election, is leading his republican opponent, Frank W. Mondell, republican floor leader in the house of representatives.

LaFollette Winning in Wisconsin

Milwaukee.--Senator Robert M. LaFollette, a five to one favorite, has been elected United States senator by a majority conservatively estimated to exceed 200,000 over his opponent, Mrs. J. B. Hooper, who headed the shattered democratic independent ticket. Available returns from 202 out of 2,533 precincts gave LaFollette, 20,770; Hooper, 3,726.

Great Sweep in New York

New York.--With 2,530 out of 2,747 districts in New York city heard from, Governor Smith had run up a plurality of 442,804. This is the greatest margin ever given a candidate.

Democrats Lead in Maryland

Baltimore.--With a little more than half the state reported, William C. Bruce, democrat, candidate for the United States senate, was leading J. I. France, republican, by 4,631 votes. All but sixty-four of these precincts are in Baltimore. The total vote: Bruce, 76,682; France, 72,051.

LODGE HAVING CLOSE RACE

Republican Senator Leading His Opponent By a Very Close Margin

Boston.--When returns from a little more than half of the election precincts in Massachusetts had been counted, Senator Lodge, republican, was leading Gaston, democrat. The vote of 922 precincts out of 1,047 in the state, including 255 Boston precincts, was: For senator, Gaston, democrat, 238,047; Lodge, republican, 226,458.

Speaker Gillett of the National house of representatives, was re-elected in the Second district. In the Sixteenth congressional district with more than two-thirds of the precincts counted, Gifford, republican, was leading Doran, democrat, by 2,384.

Johnson Leading in California

San Francisco.--Partial returns from 158 precincts scattered throughout California give for governor: Richardson, 9,611; Woolwine, 4,165; Horr (socialist), 1. For United States senator partial returns from 224 precincts give Johnson, 2,844; Parson, 1,331; Needham, 18; Sinclair, 2.
