HOG SALES

Webster county Duroc Jersey and Poland China Breeders held consignment sales.

The Duroc Jersey breeders selling 41 head under the management of J. H. Kellogg, secretary of the Duroc Jersey Association made an average of \$26.00. Some of the offering was very good and sold for a figure that made their owners a nice profit, and some of the offering that was under size did not sell at all.

The Poland China Sale under the management of J. W. Hamilton, president of the Poland China Breeders' Association made an average of \$24.00. This was the best offering ever sold in a consignment sale at Red Cloud and had it not been for threatening weather they would of sold for more money.

Webster county breeders have been holding consignment sales for three weeks and they are showing better than ever. Some of the offerings were sold in the city for a better price than ever. The offerings were: Poland, Duroc, Jersey, and Smith and Jewell counties, Kansas.
