**THE CITY COUNCIL TO
PURCHASE FIRE TRUCK**

Mayor Peter on called the Council together in special session, Wednesday morning with all members present, for the purpose of considering the purchase of a truck chassis for the Fire Department.

Councilman Crabill introduced and moved the adoption of the following resolution, which was seconded by Councilman Hoffman and carried by all members voting favorable:

Resolved:—That the city make arrangements for the purchase of a chassis for the use of the Fire Department, provided that the said department give assurance of the proper equipment and future care of the chassis, without further expense to the city. And provided further that an instrument be signed by the officials of the Department acknowledging the right of the public in the property, heretofore purchased for the use of the Fire Department.

In the matter of the written application of John W. Sheets for aid, the Council referred the matter to the County Commissioners.

On motion Council adjourned.

HOME DEMONSTRATION WORK
A meeting on Home Demonstration work will be held Tuesday, November 28th, at 10 a. m. in the County Superintendent's office.

Miss Stella Mather, Home Demonstration Leader, of Lincoln, will be here and the program of work for the coming year will be outlined.

Women's organizations can have specialists from the Extension Service meet with them on the following lines of work: Dress Forms; Sewing Machine Attachments; Home Millinery; Meat Canning and Soap Making; Meal Planning; Home Health and Home Sanitation.

All Women's Clubs are urged to be represented at this meeting. Don't wait for a special invitation. All communities that are not organized and would like this work in their community should be represented at this meeting.

Jennie Winton Laid to Rest

Jennie Winton died at Red Cloud, Nebraska November 19th, 1922. The exact date of her birth is unknown, but from what information can be obtained she was born at Oconomoc, Wisconsin October 2, 1865 and at the date of her death was 57 years, 11 months and 17 days of age. She leaves no living brothers or sisters and no one nearer related to her than nieces and nephews. She with her parents, George Winton and wife, came to Red Cloud in the early days, her parents at one time being the proprietors of the Valley House Hotel. They later moved onto the farm three miles north of Red Cloud where Jennie's mother died, leaving her father and an invalid brother, George for whom Jennie kept house until the death of her father. This left Jennie alone to manage the farm, keep house and also to support and educate her nephew, George L. Winton, who was a son of Seef, Winton by his first marriage and who was without a home other than that provided by Jennie. The brother George Winton was an invalid for several years, confined to his bed a large portion of the time and requiring a great amount of care and attention. His sister Jennie supplied his every need, watched over him and sat up with him during his years of sickness and at the same time provided for and educated her nephew, George L. Winton as well as doing the greatest part of the actual farm work on the 160 acres.

The nephew George L. Winton was taken from here when about 13 years of age by his uncle, Fred Winton, and has only been back to Red Cloud on a few brief visits since. The brother George Winton finally died leaving Jennie with a great number of unpaid debts. Soon after the death of the father, her brother, Seef, demanded his share of the parents' estate and Jennie was forced to mortgage the farm to pay him. After the death of her brother, George, Jennie stayed on the farm doing practically all the work for a few years trying to pay the debt and clear the mortgage but without making much progress. On advice of friends she then moved to town, and rented the farm, she doing any and all kinds of work and by hard work and self denial, paid all her debts including the mortgage on the farm and in addition acquired a comfortable home in Red Cloud.

Several months ago Jennie executed her will and by the terms of which she gave to her nephew George L. Winton, her home in Red Cloud together with all her household goods and personal effects. The balance of her estate she set aside as a foundation fund to be used for the erection of a public hospital at Red Cloud to be named the Jennie Winton Memorial Hospital and to be operated for the public welfare and not for private gain. It fell to Jennie's lot to observe a great deal of pain and suffering during her life and in addition to this she herself during the last few years of her life was a patient sufferer from an incurable disease. These facts together with her naturally sympathetic disposition deeply impressed upon her mind the great need of Red Cloud for a public hospital and let her make the disposition of her property that she did. Jennie was liked and loved by everyone who knew her and the memorial hospital which she has made possible because of her great love for humanity and her desire to relieve suffering and assist her fellow creatures and which will bear her name will be an ever present reminder of the splendid traits of her character and to cherish her memory in the hearts of her friends. Her future is with God. Let us mortals follow and emulate the divine injunction to spread the mantle of charity about her and perpetuate and emulate the good traits of her life.
