**R. L. Hunsicker**

Robert Lloyd Hunsicker was born on the fourth day of September, A. D. 1866, at Lockport, Pennsylvania. Coming west to carry manhood he lived for some time in Harrison county, Missouri, later removing to Atchison county, Kansas, where at the town of Muscotah, on the 16th day of June, 1885, he was joined in marriage with Laura J. Ellison. To this union seven children were born, four sons, Owen, Ray and Loren of Morland, Kansas, and Millard, of Red Cloud; and three daughters, Mrs. Vera Noble and Mrs. Lola Mitchell, of Inavale, and Miss Letha, at home. The family home was transferred to Nebraska 17 years ago, and has been in the vicinity of Inavale and Red Cloud, during this period of time.

Mr. Hunsicker united with the Friendship Baptist church in Harrison county, Missouri, in 1902, later transferring his membership to Red Cloud Baptist church, where it has since remained. In christian life he was remarkably steadfast and thoroughly rooted and grounded in his belief concerning the character and kingdom of Christ, and the life eternal as the result of Repentance and Faith. In the Red Cloud church he was chosen to the office of Deacon, which he fulfilled to the date of his decease.  
 He was also a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, which conducted their services at the grave. He departed this life at Omaha, Nebraska, on the 15th day of November, having attained the age of 56 years, 2 months and 11 days.

He leaves to mourn his decease, his wife and the seven children above named, also two brothers, Clyde and Joseph, and one sister, Myrta Hunsicker, and his aged father, Henry H. Hunsicker.  
 He finished his earthly course in suffering and pain, but he clearly understood and attested the Divine promise of help to bear and suffer, and is not, for God hath taken him. May we share his Faith and emulate the sincerity and truthfulness of his life, and also the confidence he manifested at the end.

The funeral services were held at the Baptist church on Saturday at 2 p. m., conducted by Rev. L. W. Edison, with appropriate music by the Inavale Quartette. Interment was made in the Red Cloud cemetery.

**Jacob M. Long.**

Jacob M. Long, who resided in this city for several years but for the past few months had been living with his son, Elmer, south of town, passed away Sunday evening. He was aged 84 years 1 month and 13 days.

The deceased was born in Ohio, Sept. 26, 1838. He was married three times, his first two wives preceding him to the grave. Besides his aged wife he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. W. E. Green of Minden, four sons E. C. of Bird City, Kas., Frank of Oklahoma, Perry of Los Angeles, Calif., and Elmer residing south of town, also one brother Andrew of Stockton.

The funeral services were held at the Brethren church Tuesday afternoon and the remains were taken to Chester Wednesday morning where interment was made.

**Hold Reckless Drivers To Account**

One of the most important problems before the road-using public is that of bringing reckless auto drivers to a sense of responsibility while using the public highway. If the speed maniac and the intoxicated driver endangered only their own lives we might stand by and wait for the obnoxious breed to eliminate itself, but when sane and conservative drivers are in constant danger of being crowded into the ditch when the aged and the very young have no protection but are ruthlessly run down and left unassisted by indifferent motorists who are a law unto themselves, it is necessary that steps be taken for regulating traffic and imposing penalties.

The public highway belongs to the people, and its use can very properly be controlled by law.  
 Some states require that every driver be licensed. In case of flagrant violations of traffic laws the license is suspended or revoked altogether. Probably nothing short of a penitentiary sentence would be more dreaded by the auto fan than that, while an insignificant fine, such as is the usual penalty in this state, is only a matter of a little "kidding" among one's friends.  
 Regulation of traffic should be one of the matters to engage the attention of our next legislature.
