### Commissioners Proceedings Red Cloud, Nebraska, January 1, 1923.

At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners for the first meeting of the year, the County Board of Commissioners met at 10 o'clock a. m. Members present—Waldo, Cox, Stumpenhorst, Crowell and Chaplin.

Meeting called to order by the County Clerk.

T. J. Chaplin was elected chairman of the Board for the year 1923.

Board adjourned to 1 o'clock p. m. Board re-convened at 1 o'clock with all members present.

Commissioner Chaplin appointed the following committee for the year: Bridge Dist. No. 1—Cox, Waldo, Crowell and Stumpenhorst.

Bridge Dist. No. 2—Stumpenhorst, Chaplin and Cox.

Bridge Dist. No. 3—Waldo, Crowell and Stumpenhorst.

Bridge Dist. No. 4—Crowell, Waldo and Chaplin.

Bridge Dist. No. 5—Cox, Waldo and Crowell.

Committee to check County Treasurer's office—Crowell, Cox and Chaplin.

Committee to check all other county officers—Stumpenhorst and Waldo.

Poor Farm Committee—Crowell, Waldo and Stumpenhorst.

On motion the sum of \$100 was allowed the six newspapers of the county for publishing the commissioners proceedings for the year 1923. Same to be equally divided between the six newspapers.

County Treasurer Semi-Annual statements to be published by the Guide Rock Signal and the Webster County Argus. Same to be published at one half legal rates.

Delinquent Tax List to be published by the Commercial Advertiser and the Blue Hill Leader. Same to be published at one half legal rates.

Motion made and carried that Geo. H. Overing be appointed County Highway Commissioner for Webster county for the year 1923 at a salary of \$1200 per year.

Motion made and carried that the Budget of expense necessary for the office of County Agent for the year 1923 be approved as filed with the County Clerk by the Webster County Farm Bureau. Same Budget calling for the sum of \$3270.00.

Motion made and carried that the County Clerk be instructed to advertise for Bridge bids for the year 1923.

There being no bids filed for printing and stationery each officer was instructed to buy their necessary supplies in the open market where ever they can to the best advantage of the county.

Motion made and carried that the County Superintendent be allowed the sum of \$800 for office help and expenses for the year 1923.

The County Assessor was allowed a sum not to exceed \$200 for office help for 1923.

Motion made and carried that the County Judge be allowed to retain fees of his office up to \$2200 (provided the office earns the same). The excess \$300 above his own salary can be used by him for the hiring of office help for the year 1923.

On motion made and carried the following estimate of expenses for Webster county for the year 1923 was made and adopted:
