### FARM BUREAU NOTES

(By County Extension Agent Henry R. Fausch.)

#### WEBSTER COUNTY AT DENVER STOCK SHOW

Seventeen prizes captured by Hamilton & Fausch at Denver, follows: 2 champions, 2 firsts, 2 seconds, 4 thirds, 1 fourth, 1 fifth, 2 sixths, 1 eighth, 1 eleventh and 1 twelfth.

In the exhibit was a barrow raised by County Commissioner E. J. Cox which was sold to Armour & Company for 21 cents per pound. It weighed 300 pounds. Mr. Cox bought some bred sows in the Hamilton & Fausch sale in February and raised hogs for the market.

Two barrows in the exhibit were raised by Allen Vaughn's Guide Rock, a pig club member who also bought his sow in the sale and they were good enough to win second and third. A barrow raised by Eugene White another pig club member won third. This barrow was a litter mate to the bear pig and four girls which he showed at the fair and won \$120 in prizes.

There being considerable entries passed out of the type of pigs that our pure bred breeders in this County are raising, but after winning the high prizes on fat barrows at Denver, the critics will have to back down.

The champion Durio barrow sold for 25 cents. The champion Hamilton sold for 18 cents per pound.

#### Two Fires Last Week.

#### Looses Hogs by Cholera

Perhaps the hardest streak of luck that has hit around this section in years, has visited itself upon Joe Dvoracek during the past ten days. It was some two weeks ago he ordered cars to ship out the fat hogs he was buying. The railroad company was unable to furnish them and so Joe just had to keep them, which he did, out at his ranch south of town. He also kept on buying. When he had 800 head of fat hogs on hand out at the ranch, hog cholera made its appearance. Somebody had brought him in a dose. It has proved to be the genuine old fashioned variety and takes them fast. In fact sixty-five to seventy a day has been rate they have been dying and great pyres of dead hogs have been burned daily. Joe hasn't any hopes of saving any of the 800 head. He estimates his loss around \$7,000 and all because the railroad company could not supply him cars. It's a mighty hard job, for it represents a real outlay of cash, for the hogs he has been losing are fat hogs bought for the market. There is nothing for Joe to do but grin and bear it. Sympathy abounds everywhere for him, but that doesn't make up for the financial loss that is staggering. He would like to find the fellow however, who loaded him up with sick hogs. He would teach him a real lesson that he would never forget.—Blue Hill Leader.
