**COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION ON TUESDAY**

Red Cloud, Nebraska, February 6, 1923. The County Board of Commissioners met at 10:30 a. m. as per adjournment of January 9th. All members present.

At 1:30 p. m. the bids for Superintendent of Webster county Poor Farm were opened and were as follows:

- J. L. Riggins—\$700 per year
- E. J. Emerton—\$780 per year
- Nona Brown—\$700 per year
- Ves Emick—\$700 per year
- J. T. Abbey—\$600 per year.

After consideration of the above bids, a motion was made by Crowell and seconded by Waldo that the bid of E. J. Emerton be accepted and County Clerk instructed to draw up a contract with Mr. Emerton from March 1, 1923 to March 1, 1924.

The appointment of Frank Fulton as constable of Glenwood Precinct was approved by Board.

The following Official bonds were approved by Board.

Frank Fulton, Constable, Glenwood Precinct; Elmer Garner, Road overseer, District 12 B; O. C. Stickney, District 14; J. N. Hutchins, District 6 B.

Motion made and carried that commencing from this date, the salary of the County Attendance officer be fixed at \$1.00 per year.

**CITY COUNCIL TRANSACTS CONSIDERABLE BUSINESS**

Mayor Peterson called the City Council together in regular session on Tuesday evening with all members present except Hoffman.

Minutes of January 2nd and 3rd meetings read and approved and the monthly report of city treasurer presented and placed on file.

E. J. Overing, a member of the Library Board was present and made a financial report of Library Board funds from beginning of municipal year to February 1st, showing \$31.61 balance and stated that unless the City Council gave financial aid they would be forced to close the Library until July 1st.

Motion made by Crabill and seconded by Hummell that the City Council refund the amount paid out by Library Board for Library paving for the year 1922, which amount was \$167.71. Carried.

Chas. Trautman appeared with a petition signed by himself, W. H. Beezley and Mrs. M. H. Beckwith to open the alley in Block 2, Radcliff's Addition. Motion made to refer same to city attorney. Carried.

In the matter of laying sewer pipe to connect with residence of O. D. Hedge, it was decided to lay the matter over for future reference.

Motion made by Crabill and seconded by Amack to instruct the city clerk to pay paving tax on Bank building, Library and Firemen's hall. Carried.

The City Clerk was instructed to price the city sprinkling wagon to the Wilcox village board at \$75.00, F. O. B., Red Cloud.

Ordinance 52 providing for the issuance of \$18,000 of refunding bonds was duly passed.

Motion made and seconded that the City Council pay \$3000.00 on bonds becoming due in August, held by the Harris Trust & Savings Bank. Carried.
