The eighth grade examinations are to be given March 29-30 and May 3-4. This year no seventh graders will be allowed to take any examinations except in May. In this way the returns can be sent in in shorter time.

The next teacher's examination will be April 14. Teachers should not leave the renewing of their certificate until the last thing as a second renewal of first or second grade certificates requires summer school or college credits and also raised averages besides a fixed standard that no grade can drop below.
