Income Tax Returns

Arrival of the period for filing income tax returns—January 1 to March 15, 1923—presents to American Citizens and residents the question, "Am I required to file a return?"

Requirement to file an income tax return rests upon every single person whose net income for 1922 was \$1000 or more, or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more; and upon every married person whose net income was \$2000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more, regardless of whether or not the income is taxable. Failure or "willful refusal" to file a return subjects the delinquent to a severe penalty.

To all who filed a return last year, a blank form for the 1922 return has been mailed. However, failure to receive a form does not relieve the taxpayer of his obligation to file a return and pay the tax on time.

Necessary forms can be procured at any bank, or by making request of Collector of Internal Revenue, Omaha, Nebraska.
