Red Cloud, Nebr., March 5, 1923.
The Board of Education met in regular session at the Commercial Club room at 8 o'clock p. m.

The next matter taken up by Board was the election of Superintendent of school. On motion by Grimes, seconded by Perry, A. B. Gelwick was unanimously re-elected for one year at a salary of \$2600.00.

Motion made and carried that the recommendation of the teachers committee be accepted and above teachers be elected, also that the teachers committee be authorized to fill all vacancies in the teaching staff for the coming school year at salaries per new schedule.

No further business appearing the Board adjourned to meet April 2nd, 1923.
