**52 Cattle Sell at \$115 Average**

The Shorthorn Cattle Sale of J. M. Steward & Son and Henry Fausch was held at the Sale Pavilion Wednesday afternoon. A large crowd was present, but owing to the stormy weather many out of town buyers from a distance were absent.

The offering consisted of fifty two head, the top bull selling for \$100 and the top cow \$40, the average being \$115 per head. All but three head were sold to the farmers of this county who have herds of Shorthorn cattle and they knowing the good breeding strains of these cattle were anxious to add them to their herds.

Col. A. W. Thompson of York was the auctioneer and was one of the best that has ever held a sale in this city while Col. J. H. Ellinger, H. C. McKelvie and H. Blank took bids. The following is the list of buyers:
