On motion by Grimes seconded by Overing, Joe Barta was re-elected janitor of the Washington school at a salary of \$100 per month and E. B. Goble as janitor of Lincoln school at a salary of \$80 per month. Said salary to be for the school year of nine months only any additional time put in by janitors during vacation to be under the instructions of the Buildings and Grounds committee.

Considerable time was spent in discussing methods of providing more school facilities caused by the loss of the Junior High School building by recent fire. It seemed to be the opinion of the Board that additional room must be provided but it was deemed advisable to first consult an architect regarding the advisability of building on to the new High School building. Secretary was instructed to write Fisk & McGimmes, Architects, of Lincoln and ask them to meet with the Board as soon as possible regarding this matter.

The Buildings and Grounds committee were authorized to salvage all possible from recent fire and dispose of brick, etc., to the best advantage. No further business the Board adjourned at 10 o'clock p. m.
