Omaha, Nebraska, May 14th.—Vigorous efforts are now being made to secure applicants by all state, county and local chairmen. In charge of the procurement campaign for the 1923 Citizens Military Training Camp. It is desired to enroll candidates and complete the quota for the State of Nebraska as early a date as possible.

Young men between the ages of 17 and 24 years who desire to apply for admission to the training camp should do so at once. Local and county chairmen will gladly furnish information regarding applications and physical examinations.
