CORN VARIETY TEST

Corn variety test plot was planted on Henry W. Lambrecht's farm north of Inavale as follows: Reids and Houges crossed yellow, smooth kernel ears, Reids and Houges crossed yellow rough kernel ears, yellow Leaming from A. Schultz, Red from H. W. Lambrecht, soy beans from H. R. Fausch, St. Charles white raised in bottom from George Ohmstede, St. Charles white raised on upland from H. R. Fausch, Boone county white from Lawrence Means, Iowa Silvermine from H. R. Fausch, White Elephant from H. Lambrecht.

This fall a Field Day will be held when these varieties will be husked and weighed. Remnant ears have been saved and will be on exhibition.
