He came to America with father, sister and brothers in 1869 and lived in Illinois for 10 years, then moved to Platte county in 1879.

He was married to Sophia Peterson in 1882 and settled on a homestead near Lindsay. In 1905 he and his family moved to Webster county, where his remaining years were spent.

He leaves to mourn his departure his faithful wife, eight children, John of Lindsay, Henry, Oscar, Helen, Pearl, Anna Mabel and William all of Inavale, five grand children and one brother, John P. of Lindsay.

Six children preceded their father to the great beyond; four of them died in infancy. Charles gave his life for his country at Chateau Thierry July 1918. Roy died in December 1918.

Mr. Johnson joined the Baptist church when he was eighteen years of age and he remained true to the faith.

He was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America for many years. He was greatly esteemed by his neighbors as a man of honor and integrity.

Funeral services were conducted at the home and at New Virginia church, Tuesday at 2:30 by Rev. R. B. E. Hill of Hastings assisted by the pastor Rev. Simpson.
