R. Florance presented and ordered placed on file. Annual report of Clarissa M. Maynard presented and ordered placed on file.

W. A. Patten appeared and asked for a raise in his salary of \$10.00 per month. Moved by Christy and seconded by Amack that Patten be given a raise of \$10.00 per month in his salary. Yeas: Christy and Amack. Nays, Hoffman and Hummel. Lost. Application of John Barkley for license to operate a confectionary stand and corn popper laid over until next meeting.

Moved by Christy and seconded by Amack, that the city consult an engineer as to plans and specifications preparatory to tiling the water way on Eighth Avenue. Yeas: Amack, Christy and Hummel. No: Hoffman. Carried.

Councilman Hoffman, chairman of Finance committee presented estimate of expense for the year 1924 and moved its adoption, seconded by Hummel. Yeas: Christy, Amack, Hoffman and Hummel. Carried.

Application of S. R. Lewis for a raise in his salary of \$13 per month. Rejected.

Moved by Hoffman and seconded by Hummel that the Clerk be instructed to renew the \$8,000.00 Fire and Tornado Insurance on the Power House with the American Insurance Co. Also the Workman Compensation with the Globe Indemnity Co. Yeas: Christy, Amack, Hoffman and Hummel. Carried.

### Webster Co. Cattle Again Take Top Market at K. C.

Webster County feed lots were well represented on the Kansas City cattle market June 4 by 11 Hereford steers that scored the top price for the day and for the year by selling at \$10.90 a hundredweight. These market-toppers were two-year-olds raised and fed by J. H. Crary of Guide Rock. They were well-fattened and rendered as to loin and quarters, and were the calves from Mr. Crary's herd of Hereford cows. The top figure was forty cents higher than bulk of sales which ranged from \$9.00 to \$10.50, showing a very satisfying premium paid for the good "whitefaces" from Webster County.

The second highest price for the day went to R. Morgan of Plattsburg, Missouri, who marketed 52 Panhandle branded Herfords weighing an average of 1478 pounds each that brought \$10.85 a hundredweight.

V. F. Brown of Hubbell, Nebraska, also offered an attractive bunch of "Whitefaces" at Kansas City on June 4. His four car string averaged 1429 pounds a head and sold at \$10.75 a hundredweight. The Brown cattle were branded Colorado Herfords, of mountain type and breeding.
