COUNCIL CONTRIBUTES \$10.00 TOWARD NEW CABLE

Red Cloud, Nebr., July 3, 1923 Mayor Peterson called Council together in regular session at Council Chamber. Members present, Amack, Christy, Hummel and Hoffman.

Minutes of regular meeting of June 5, 1923 and special meeting of June 21, 1923, read and approved. Monthly report of S. R. Florance, city treasurer presented and ordered placed on file.

Motion made by Christy and seconded by Amack that the Council advertise for bids for paving Panama Canal according to blue print. Yeas, Christy and Amack, No, Hummel and Hoffman.

Motion made by Hoffman and seconded by Amack that the Council pay \$10.00 toward putting a cable on the flag pole pulley. Yeas, Christy, Amack, Hummel and Hoffman. Carried.

Councilman Hoffman introduced the Levy Ordinance for 1923 which provides as follows and was duly passed.

Section I There is hereby levied on all the taxable property of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, the following taxes on each one dollar of the assessed valuation of both real and personal property in said city for the purposes hereinafter mentioned:

General Fund 5 mills
Electric Light Plant 5 mills
Public Library 1 mill
Fire Department 4 mills
Interest on Light and Water bonds 5 mills

Interest on Sewer bonds 1.1 mills
Interest on Paving and Refund bonds 4.2 mills
Account Paving Intersection bonds 2 mills
Total, 14.7 mills
