

FARM BUREAU NOTES

(By County Agent, H. R. Fausch) Fruit and vegetable budget work inished this week. The Rotary Women's Club met at the home of Mrs. Geo. Ohmstede, the Happy Hour nd Cloverleaf Clubs met at the home of Mrs. Henry Jahn, the Bladen Women's Club at the home of Mrs. Wegman and the Red Cloud Com munity Club at the home of Mrs. Everett Coon, and the Five Star at the home of Mrs. Frank Kral. "Comparison of Menus" was the subject at these meetings by Miss Florance Atwood, food and nutrition specialist from Lincoln.

This work was started by Miss Atwood in four rural schools. The work is put on by Women's Clubs of the community. The children are measured and weighed. Each child is given a card to correspond to weight. White card for normal weight blue card for less than 7% underweight and red card for 7% or more underweight.

In six weeks or the second meeting the children will be re-weighed and all who make gains will be given a silver star, at the third meeting a gold star will be given to all children up to weight. This work was started in the following schools: Rotary Club. Miss Ruth Atkincon. teacher, and 18 pupils 8 received white car, 2 blue cards and 8 red. District 68, work sponsored by Cloverleaf Club, Irwin Hartman, teacher, 16 pupils. 2 received white cards, 7 blue cards and 7 red cards.

Dstrict 38, work sponsored by Five Star Club. Reka Steen teacher, 16 puipls. 5 received white cards, blue cards and 3 red cards.

District 58, work sponsored by Red Cloud Community Club. Marcella Stockman, teacher, 12 pupils, 6 received white cards, 4 blue cards and 2 red cards.

IN EDUCATION AMERICA HAS NOT FAILED

Immigrants who come to America are often disappointed in finding that conditions are not just as they expected. Perhaps the golden stream s not poured out quickly and coplously enough; perhaps the restrictions which the policeman and the sanitary inspector place upon them don't meet their ideas of American freedom; perhaps the food they must eat and the liquids they must drink are not those of the land from which they came. It is only natural that such things should cause a feeling of distisfaction.

In one respect, however, no immigrant has ever been dissapointed, and that is in the provisions which America makes for the education of children. The Polish Jew who

a taught in secrecy, if at all, and fear of imprisonment, finds here that education is as free as the sunlight. The German who was restrictel to a few studies supposed to be suited to his station and was not w permitted to pursue the higher courses finds in America that his children may attend any school for waich they are prepared and that they sit side by side with the sons of the wealthy and cultured. The Englishmen who was barred from the privileges of recond ary education by the fees charged or by failure to procure a scholarship finds that high schools, housed superbly, are open to all without price and without formality save that which is necessary to insure academic readi

In no other country on earth is education suitable to the advancement of the pupil offered without distinction of class and without cost to all who apply. Americans know no other way for their schools have been so conducted from the beginning; but when Europeans come to us they quickly observe and generally appreciste the advanages which they enjoy for the first time. It often happens that the schools are the deciding factor in determining desirable immigrants to remain when they might otherwise be persuaded to o'clock every Sunday Evening. return to the homes of their child-
