In so doing, it apparently gave correct reflection of serious financial judgment. The statement of Great Britain's foreign trade in May had some bearing on the sterling market. Exports of Britaish products increased only slightly over April and were smaller than in any other month this year; but the import trade rose to a figure not matched in a twelve month, except for last November. Nevertheless, the surplus of imports for the five completed months was 53,000,000 pounds less than in 1920.


