Cleveland, June 15.—(By A. P.)—A frankly pessimistic view of some of the predominant tendencies of American political thought was voiced today by Secretary Weeks of the War Department at the commencement exercises of Western Reserve university. In an address which he said he was tempted to entitle "The Decline of the American Government," the war secretary declared the drift of recent years was gradually weakening the nation's governmental structure by undermining the constitution and sweeping away the principles of party responsibility.

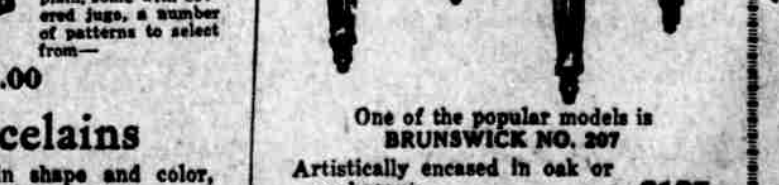
