

National Collegiate Track and Field Meet Is Scheduled for Today

Large Entry List to Compete in Final Events

Gardner of Nebraska Qualifies in Half Mile Run—Records Expected to Tumble.

Stagg Field, June 16.—With more than 300 athletes, the cream of America's college athlete world entered the national collegiate track and field meet which will be held on Stagg field here tomorrow with inaugurations favoring a shattering of records. The crack California team which won the eastern intercollegiate meet and Illinois, winner of the Western conference championship, are regarded as the favorites, while Nebraska, winner of the Missouri Valley conference title; Pennsylvania State, Notre Dame, Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota are expected to be dangerous contenders for second place honors. All of these teams will have a full quota of 10 performers in the meet. There will be 53 universities and colleges represented.

Illinois, which won the 1921 meet, entered the games this year at the eleventh hour after Coach Gill had announced that his team would not compete. The finals tomorrow are expected to result in a duel between Illinois and California, with the prospects that California will triumph. The California squad is well balanced and particularly strong in the field events.

The meet probably will be the greatest college track event ever held. With very few exceptions all of the men capable of winning any of the 15 events will be among the starters. With the exception of Wolters of Ames' all of the winners of the recent Western conference meet will compete and a majority of the eastern and far western stars are entered.

Trial heats were run off in the 440 yard run and half mile events this afternoon to reduce the fields for the finals. There were 21 starters in the three heats of the quarter mile. The first three runners in each heat qualified for the finals. Cochrane, a qualified performer from the Mississippi A and M, made the fastest time in the 440, breaking the tape just ahead of McDonald of California in the third heat in 1:04.5. California and Chicago qualified two from each of the quarter mile final. Fredrickson of California, won the first heat in 51.35 and will go into the finals with McDonald, his teammate. Pyott and Brickman were the Chicago entries to qualify. Brickman won his heat in 51.45. Frederickson of Illinois, the favorite to win tomorrow, the Illinois flyer finished second to Brickman in his trial heat but did not extend himself.

Brown Wins Heat.
Larry Brown of Pennsylvania, winner of the half-mile in the eastern intercollegiate meet in 1:55.25 won his qualifying heat in this event in 2:00.70. Captain Yates of Illinois' team, took the first heat in 2:01.45, beating out Helfrich of Pennsylvania State.

Sixteen starters in the two qualifying heats of the half-mile, but only eight will start in the final. The qualifiers are: Yates, Illinois; Helfrich, Pennsylvania; Nebraska; Brown, Pennsylvania; Noell, Iowa; Shields, Pennsylvania State and Martin, Central Wesleyan. Brown is regarded as the probable winner, although Yates may prove dangerous.
